

### Hampton and the "Outrages."

THE GOVERNOR REPLIES TO SWAILS AND COMMITS THE CASE TO THE CIRCUIT SOLICITOR.

Swails, it will be remembered, wrote to Governor Hampton touching the conduct of the Williamsburg Red-shirts. His complaint was that when he was returning home from a meeting in the country he was suddenly surrounded by a large number of horsemen, wearing red shirts and acting generally in an improper manner, and after some minutes elapsed, in response to his own inquiry, the leader of the Red-shirts informed him that he was under arrest. In this manner he was carried into the town of King-street, and on arriving there he called upon Trial Justice Steele for protection, but that officer failed to give him satisfaction. At a subsequent date he was notified by a delegation of white citizens that he must leave the county and not return on peril of his life. The reply of Governor Hampton is as follows:

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER, COLUMBIA, S. C., October 24, 1878.

Sir: Owing to absence of some days from my office, I did not receive your letter until a day or two since, and this accounts for my delay in replying.

While I deprecate all acts of violence, and am always willing to exert proper authority in maintaining the laws, you must recognize that I have no power to exercise judicial authority, nor to take cognizance of such offences as fall under the jurisdiction of legal tribunals. If the facts you state are correct, the parties who stopped and arrested you on the public highway were guilty of a grave offence, and it is your duty to have them indicted. The courts are open to all citizens, and all can secure justice before them. The only matter that I can with propriety act upon is the charge made against Trial Justice Steele, and this shall be fully investigated. All my efforts during this canvass have been used to promote harmony and preserve the peace. If there should occur any public disturbance where I could properly act, all the authority of my office shall be used to quell it, and to give full protection to all citizens of the State.

I have no sympathy with lawlessness of any sort, nor with those who seek to produce discord between the two races.

At the same time Governor Hampton wrote to Mr. Hirsch, the circuit solicitor, a Republican, as follows:

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER, COLUMBIA, S. C., October 24, 1878.

My Dear Sir: I feel it to be my duty to lay the enclosed papers before you as solicitor, so that you may give them a full investigation, and I am assured that you will take all proper steps to see that justice is done to all parties. If any wrong has been committed, the courts are the proper tribunals for their redress, and the complaints should properly come before you. I beg you to report the result of your investigation to me.

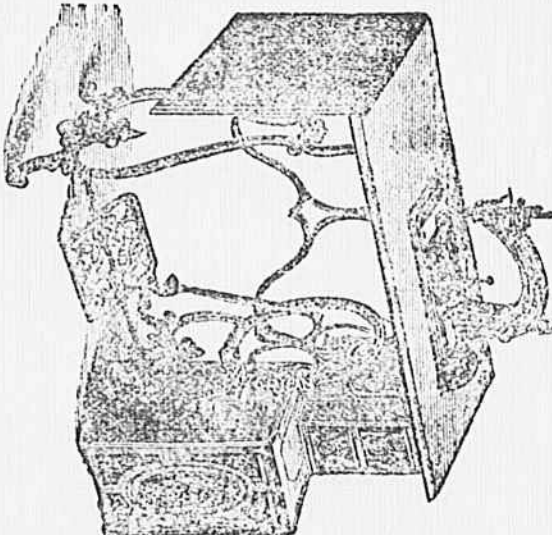
