Editor Orangeburg Times:

DEAR SIR,

It has been my purpose for some time to direct public attention, to a matter where public interest is involved; but one and another preventive of a private nature interposed, and not until the present have I been able to give the subject the attention it merits. Mature reflection advises the County newspaperers—as the proper medium through which to arrest the attention of those concerned; and I propose to do so as briefly and concisely as possible. Doubtless very many beside myself who have occasion to cross the Elisto opposite the Village have noticed the fact that the site of the present bridge is a very unfortunate, and inconvenient one. The point where the Ninety Six, Cannon's Bridge, and Barnwell Roads intersect each other and tap the river swamp, is a point immediately opposite the Village, and where the swamp is equally as narrow if not more so, than where the present bridge is located. Beside this the intervening ground is higher, and the lake near river; thereby lessening the amount of embanking, and bridging to constitute it an admirable highway. If you will observe, after reaching the river by the present route, you are compelled by changing direction at right angles to travel in the swamp at least a quarter of a mile, encountering a broad, and deep lake and long causeway spanned by a bridge nearly one hundred and fifty yards in length, before you reach the main causeway leading to the river bridge, which causeway is also fenced by some five or six flat bridges. And after reaching the east bank of the river by an oblique change of direction both to the right you must travel nearly three quarters of a mile before the suburbs of the Village are reached. In addition to the long lake below we have now to keep up a foot way over a quarter of a mile in length also. The annual cost of the two must be at least one hundred dollars. Now by changing the route across the swamp allowing one end of the new causeways to terminate at the intersection of the public roads, and the other, at or near the old lumber landing on Village side, the distance would be shortened near three fourths of a mile, and the County saved a yearly expense of 100 dollars or more which is a consideration worth our attention to say nothing of the other advantages to grow out of the change of much greater importance. If we would properly husband time, it would not require exceeding four days to clear out and put in plenum order the new route, and we would find if the lumber now used on the old was transferred to the new road it would floor it from one end to the other. In addition to the interest which the public generally should manifest in this change; the Village, specially should contribute something toward its consummation as it would if completed property give the citizens of the town, a beautiful promenade, and nowhere about could be found as pleasant a road for a buggy and horseback riding. The citizens of the Fork should by all means interest themselves on this enterprise as it would enable them to get to market by some nearer route, and at the same time avoid one of most disagreeable and trying roads to man, horse, and vehicle in the County. What say you County Commissioners? Put your shoulders to the wheels and rush the matter through before the coming spring.
