Our Sunday Field Glass

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH—Rev. J. D. A. Brown selected as his text, Romans 8th Chapter and 6th and 7th verses: "For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. Because the carnal mind is enmity against God; for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be." The subject of the sermon was, "The total depravity of mankind in its original condition," the truth of which was proved by various considerations; it was a doctrine which had been tenaciously held by the most religious men for centuries, and surely if it did not find a place in the religious belief of true christians, it could not have maintained its position for such a great length of time. It was further proved from the universality of sin, and the subject was further illustrated by referring to the exhibition of self will, anger, revenge and other sins in children of the tenderest age. "Foolishness (i. e. moral depravity) is bound up in the heart of a child." The total depravity of the human race being admitted, it follows conclusively that the doctrine of "an conditional election" must be true, and that man cannot be saved by works. He exhorted his hearers, therefore, to flee to the Refuge set before them, and to repent and believe, and hold up the exhortations and promises of the Scriptures as their warrant to come to the Savior.

LUTHERAN CHURCH—Rev. J. F. Kiser took as his morning text: "They profess that they know God, but in works they deny him, being abominable and disobedient, and unto every good work reprobate." He showed that the disciple spoke of those persons who belong to the church, but only observe the form and have not the spirit of true religion. That they reject Christ and so become in the sight of God abominable. But that the saving power is so great that if such a person should ask the question "What must I do to be saved?" The answer will come back, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ!"

METHODIST CHURCH—In the morning Rev. O. A. Darby, the pastor, delivered an interesting and impressive sermon from the text taken from Isaiah, "He shall see of the travail of his soul, and be satisfied."
