Our Hope. A fortnight ago we wrote an editorial on the subject of a Yarn Factory in Orangeburg, and the great advantage of the new invention of the Clement Attachment which is destined to revolutionize the country.

Since our writing we are glad to hear that our Orangeburg Agricultural Society has revived the subject of the Factory, and a Committee has been appointed to put the matter in operation. We are glad to note this step in the march of progress, and we hope we will not be called upon to record any retrograde movement.

It requires very little capital, and as Col. Farrow says in the Spartanburg Herald, "it saves the expense of bagging, ties &c; it saves the expense of handling the cotton by speculators and paying freights, storage &c; it will give employment to labor at home; and it will force capitalists to bring factories to the cotton fields."

It is an entirely practicable scheme. Not only one, but several ought to be in Orangeburg County. Let our Agricultural Society start the ball, and that promptly.

Immigration.

We do not think the Democratic party since it has been in power has done its duty on this matter. We have low taxes and many other benefits which accrue to all parties alike, but we have been too indifferent to our own good. There is as we may say, the only permanent remedy government must come from this, that is the increase of our population by foreign immigration.

Follies.

We thought Butler's blood hound exhibition in New York was bad enough, but right on the heels of it comes Bab' Combs' dispatch to Grant. There is no tolling to what extent such follies mould public opinion against us, and it is a lamentable fact that a great people has to suffer for them.

We have heard a great deal said by our friends on this subject late, and we have no doubt as the Legislature is about to meet that the discussion will be renewed. It is maintained by many that the cost of fences is very great, and that the enclosing of stock instead of crops will be a great saving both to capitalist and laborer.

Without advancing any opinion ourselves upon the merits or demerits of the proposed law, we believe the Legislature made a botch of it at the last session. To give some townships the right to pass the law where a neighboring township does not, does great harm in necessitating the building of township fences and public gates.
