### Our Hope.

A fortnight ago we wrote an editorial on the subject of a Yara Factory in Orangeburg, and the great advantage of the new invention of the Clement Attachment which is destined to revolutionize the com ry.

Since our writting we are glad to hear that our Orangeburg Agricultural Society has revived the subject of the Factory, and a Committee has been appointed to put the matter in operation. We are glad to note this step in the march of progress, and we hope we will not be called upon to record any retrograde movement. Don't stop gentlemen until you have got the capital subscribed, and have made the enter prise a success. The South is tired of polities, and she has had enough of late to make her so. Her success depends upon her material development, and we regard the Clement Attachment, that is, this invention to convert seed cotton directly into yarn, as the agent for its accomp lishment. It is peculiarly adapted to the South. The North has no seed cotton, and therefore can't be benefitted by it We are spinning no yarns ourselves, but only giving the facts as they came to us. The new invention is being introduced all over the South and is attracting a ttention every where. We believe it will yet make us'a manufacturing people as well as the North, and, as we have often said before, upon this diversification of our labor depends our prosperity. Dr. Lawton of Geor gia on a recent visit to one of these attachments in Oconce, facetiously, but we think wisely remarks, "with these machines as a Southern industry, and the Christian Index as a mor al civilizer, the South would rise up from its ashes in a very few years"

It requires very little capital, and, as Col. Farrow says in the Spartanburg Herald, "it saves the expense of bagging, ties &c.; it saves the expense of handling the cotton by speculators and paying freights, storage &e; it will give employment to labor at home; and it will force capitalists to bring factories to the cotton fields."

It is an entirely practicable schem-Not only one, but several ought to be in Orangeburg County. Let our Agricultural Society star the ball and that promptly.

### Immigration.

We do not think the Democratic party since it has been in power has done its duty on this matter.
