Suffering of the North Ca olina Negro Emigrants.

The Carolina negroes continue to arrive. Since November 27th over 2,500 have come, and not one to day is making money enough to provide the necesaries of life for himself and family. In one night 159 of the deltdcd wretelle- arrived, and 400 more are expected within ten days. One of these immigrants unbosomed himsel to a Neutinel reporter vesterday. The conversation opened thus:

"Where are you from?" "Lenoir County, North Carolina," "Why did you come here?"

"Samuel Terry and Peter C. Williams came to us and said get ready and go to Indiana. They 'lectioneer' ed just as they do in election times. They promised that if I camete In liana I would receive from \$2 to \$3 per day for any kind of labor, and that I would be provided with a house to live in."

"What other promises?"

"Well, sley said that there were 500 houses built and furnished for us; that we would be given bedelothing and suits and a milk cow."

"Were you to get work?"

"Oh, yes, sir; we was given the privilege of farming for ourselves or weeking at \$3 per day. They said we could buy good land at \$1.50 to \$2 per sere, and that provisions would be furnished us for seven months. and those who did not buy land would be hired by men as soon as they arrived in the city, right from the trants."
