A rather indescribable political meeting was held at Way's Store on Wednesday night. The colored people assembled in large numbers to hear speeches, several gentlemen being invited from the town of Orangeburg, and from the community. At the appointed hour about seventy-five colored people and the same number of whites had assembled. Speeches were then made by J. H. Felder, Julius Edwards, S. R. Mellichamp and John Sellers on the Democratic side. After this there was a general expression of sentiment from the colored people at least six or seven speaking until midnight. The sentiments they expressed were Democratic in most cases and neutral in other cases. No rabid Republican speech was made. The key-note of the Democratic speakers that every man was a freeman, and should vote as he pleased and not as a slave, was repeated by every speaker. The result of the meeting was decidedly encouraging.

At the meeting of the Court House Democratic Club on Tuesday evening a resolution was passed calling for a grand Democratic torch light procession and demonstration to-night. The following gentlemen have been appointed a Committee of Arrangements, which is in itself a guarantee of success: Let every man turn out, and we hope that our colored friends will not be afraid to come out and listen to what is said, if they do nothing more. Let us see if they are freemen, or if they are the slaves of party leaders. We hope the surrounding clubs from the country will come in and swell the crowd.
