EDUCATION. The report of the Superintendent of education is a source of encouragement. It contains also much food for thought. Since the inauguration of Democratic government in 1876, despite the fact that a Radical back indebtedness of \$209,340 had to be provided for, astounding improvements have been made. The school fund has raised from \$182,352 to \$351,415, the last appropriation; and 31,676 more children have been taught.

Besides this, in Winnsboro, Chester and Charleston, permission has been given, by special legislation, for the people to levy a local tax, which has been cheerfully paid, and flourishing graded schools are now blessing these communities.

We would suggest to our delegation in the Legislature to pass an act giving Orangeburg the same privilege. We don't mean to forget the matter upon us, but merely to give the opportunity of doing what we please in reference to a very important subject. The passage of the act need not compel us to execute its provisions, unless we so elect, but it opens to us the road to improvement.

Orangeburg is growing to be a city of some importance, and in our material progress, we should not forget the intellectual. In the language of the "News and Courier," "There is no royal road to fortune. But we shall find the right road and keep in it when, for blacks and whites alike, for rich and poor, for the lowly and the exalted, Democrat and Republican, the precept and practice shall be to educate, educate, educate!"

THE DEAD LETTER OFFICE.

The following report of the Postmaster General will be of interest to all letters and packages were received at the Dead Letter Office during the fiscal year ending June 30, of which, round numbers, 2,700,000 were sent either from the local Post Offices, unclaimed. 290,600 were returned for no address, and 9,000 were not addressed at all.

The receipts of the Dead Letter Office also included about 60,000 letters returned by the persons addressed having left for other places, and 91,000 letters and packages returned from foreign countries. The great mass of these, a number of letters and packages contained nothing of value and were destroyed.
