President Hayes has sent in a long message to Congress the burden of which is, the elections in the South. Mr. Hayes thinks that these elections have been unfair, and need investign. tion, and doubtless wishes that the Democratic members of Congress from this section should not receive or retain their seats. It seems impossible for men to look at and deal with others as they would themselves. If the people of the North were placed in the same position that we are, and had the same political problem to grapple with, would they do any better than we do? We would like to see the tables turned for a short time merely for the experiment. We would see then if they would practice so devoutly what they are now preaching. It is very good to standoff at a distance in safe and soft places and talk morality and religion to us; but to practice it, when subjected to the trial, is what proves the man. - We are rather inclined to different the world over.

We all want fair elections and we will have them too if left alone and given time to work out our political problem. The subject is now engaging the minds of all our leading men. Elections must be fair, and at the same time our civilization must be maintained. If the blind partisanship and fanatical legislation of the North is to rain the South, we would ask in preference to be treated as a conquered subject and be given military rule. This is better than Radical plundering to which the foreshadowed narrow national policy

There are other parts of the message which are worthy and we hope will receive attention. The recommendation for national aid in education in the states is very proper. The state appropriations are inadequate to the purpose, and we hope that this scheme will be carried out.

TAXING DEBTS AS PROPERTY.

One is, to exempt from the taxable value of property the whole amount of encumbrances upon it, so that the person who holds and leads, not the person who receives and lower, shall alone pay the tax. In this way the person who dends B a thousand dollars knows that he will get the rate of interest that was agreed upon, ithout any rebate or reduction. The bortgage is an evidence of debt and is utterly absurd to make what one ves pay as if it were something that ge had.
