THE SECRET.

Mr. Stephens tells the secret of the defeat of the Educational bill in Congress a few weeks ago. All attempts at compromise being ended, the two parties stood pitted against each other almost equal in numbers drawn up for the battle of the day.

AN ORDINANCE.

To Raise Supplies for the Town of Orangeburg, S. C., for the Fiscal Year ending 1st April A. D. 1882 and a Bill to Regulate Licenses.

Section 1. Be it Ordained by the Town Council of Orangeburg, and it is hereby Ordained by the authority of the same: That the following Taxes and Licenses hereby assessed and levied for the fiscal year beginning April 1st A. D. 1882, and after the following rates, that is to say:

1st. At the rate of 5 mills upon the assessed value of all real estate lying and being within the Corporate Limits of the town of Orangeburg, S. C., including every Building or other improvements on land under Lease from Bodies Corporate or individuals for any term of years.

2d. Be it further Ordained, That the value of all Improvements on Real Estate since last Appraisal shall be assessed for taxation by the Clerk of Council.

3d. Be it further Ordained, That every Person, Firm, Company or Corporation engaged in any Trade, Business or Profession or Occupation, mentioned in the following list, shall obtain a License on or before the 1st day of May A. D. 1882, a License to be obtained in Orangeburg, S. C.

1st. Those conducting business after the 1st April A. D. 1882, shall obtain a License before entering into any business.

Sec. IV. If any person or persons shall exercise or carry on any Trade, Business or Profession for the exercise, carrying on or doing of which a license is required by this ordinance without taking out such license as in that behalf required he, she or they shall besides being liable for the payment of the license, be subject to a fine not exceeding \$100 or less than \$5 and to be imprisoned for a term not more than thirty days, for each and every violation of this ordinance.

Sec. V. In every license to be taken out under or by the authority of this ordinance shall be contained and set forth the purpose Trade, Business or Profession, for which such license is granted and the name or place of business of the person or persons taking out the same.

Sec. VI. The Town Clerk shall prepare a proper form of License to be issued in each case which License shall be kept by the person receiving the same in a conspicuous place as the Town Clerk may direct.

Sec. VII. A License granted after the 1st day of April A. D. 1880 shall continue in force until the 1st day of April A. D. 1881 and all Licenses granted after the 1st day of April 1880 shall be issued upon the payment of a rateable proportion of the whole amount of money imposed for such license provided however that no License be granted for less than three months though the time at the end of the year be less than that.

Sec. VIII. Each License granted shall be dated on the 1st day of the month in which the liability therefor accrues and the amount to be paid therefor shall be computed therefrom until the end of the year; and every person exercising or carrying on any trade, business or profession shall keep said License in their possession, and unless they shall do so shall be deemed and taken to have no License, and it shall be the duty of the Town Marshal and Detective Force to report any violation thereof.

Sec. IX. Upon the removal of any person or persons from the house or premises at which any trade, business or profession mentioned in such license was authorized it may not be valid for the Town Clerk to authorize by endorsement of such License, the person removing as aforesaid to any other place in the corporation to carry on the trade, business or profession specified in such License at the place to which such person may have removal.

Sec. X. For a License to carry on any trade, business or profession on hereinafter mentioned shall be paid to the Town Clerk or Treasurer, viz:

Apothecaries, \$25; Ambrotypists for one year or less, \$5; Architects, \$5; Agents of Sewing Machines, each \$5; Auctioneers and Commission Merchants, resident \$10; no license to be granted for less than six months; Auctioneers, transient, per day, \$5.

Barbers, each \$5; Banks \$50; Buggies that haul within 400 Dollars and Commission Agents \$10; Blacksmiths, \$5; Boat and Shoe Makers, \$5; Billiard Tables, each \$30; Boarding houses \$5; Brick Yard, \$10.

Contractors, \$10; Cigar Makers \$12.50; Circuses per day \$50; Carriages, that haul for hire, \$ 0; Cabinet Makers \$5.

Boys each \$1; Drays \$5; Dentists, each \$10; Dealers in Goods, Wares and Merchandise other than distilled Spirits whose annual sales are not over \$5000, \$10; and for each additional \$1000 or fraction thereof, 75 cents.

Gunsmiths, \$5; Game Tables of any kind whatsoever other than Billiard, \$5.

Hacks, that haul for hire \$5; Lucksters for this fiscal year or part thereof, \$2; Hatters, \$12.50; Harness Makers and Repairers, \$5; Horses and Mules head (colly) \$1.

Insurance Companies, life or fire, on each Company represented \$10.

Jewelry, Watch and Clock Repairers, \$10; Junk Shows, \$5.

Liquor Dealers, by the quart, \$5; Liquor Dealers, by the pint or otherwise, \$10; provided that no license be granted for less than six months.

Every stable, \$5; Lawyers, \$10 each, whether in firm or not.

Quilting \$5; Theatres, each \$5; Peddlers per month \$10; Plumbers each \$5.

Sawyers, each \$5. Repairs of Furniture \$2; Restaurants, each, \$5.

Sole Stables, each \$30; Shows, side and concerts, per night \$3; Salesmen, itinerant, per day, \$5.

Wagon that haul for hire \$3; Wheelwrights, \$10.

Timbers, \$10; Tanneries, \$5; Tailors, \$5; Lithograph companies \$10.

Master Mechanics \$5; Machines, Rice Mills \$10; Planing Mills \$5; Grist Mills \$5; Saw Mills \$5; Milliners \$5.

Sec. XI. Be it further Ordained, That all male inhabitants of the Town of Orangeburg between the ages of 18 and 50 (excluding females) shall be liable to military duty, and shall also be subject to a compound tax of \$2 each which said tax shall be appropriated to the uses and improvements of the corporation.

Sec. XII. Be it further Ordained, That Hucksters license shall not be liable to any deduction on account of the time in which such license shall be issued.

Sec. XIII. Be it further Ordained, That the owners or owners of dogs within the Town of Orangeburg, S. C., shall pay a tax of \$1 upon each and every dog owned by him or her and that the owner or owners thereof shall be provided with a collar to be furnished at the expense of the Town, and on and after the first day of June next ensuing any dog owned by any person living in said Town, found upon the streets without such collar shall be taken up by the Marshal and the owner notified thereof, and if such owner or owners shall fail to pay the license upon such dog or dogs, within five days after being so notified, said dog or dogs shall be killed.

Sec. XIV. Be it further Ordained, That all ordinances or parts of ordinances levying a tax or prescribing the mode or time of returning or paying the same or any other regulation in relation thereto are hereby continued in full force and effect so far as the same are not in conflict with the provision of this ordinance.

Sec. XV. Be it further Ordained, That all Town Taxes on real estate required under this ordinance shall be payable within (30) thirty days from the (20) twentieth day of April A. D. 1880. All taxes unpaid after the expiration of the (30) day shall be subject to an additional tax of twenty per centum on real estate and twenty per centum on Licenses.

Sec. XVI. Be it further Ordained, That all approved claims against the Town be received in payment of taxes and licenses and other dues against the Town.

Sec. XVII. Be it further Ordained, That the fiscal year shall begin on the first day of April A. D. 1880.

Sec. XVIII. Be it further Ordained, That this ordinance shall remain in force until amended or repealed.

Sec. XIX. Be it further Ordained, That all ordinances or part of ordinances relating against this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.
