Summers of Orangeburg, and another on the labor question, by Mr. C. H. Moise of Sumter. After the discussion of these questions, the Society adjourned for the day, for the enjoyment of a ride around the city, and a visit to Piedmont Factory. The Health of Washington.

From common report and occasional newspaper paragraphs, the health of the city of Washington does not appear to be any of the best. It is said that the malaria from the Potomac affects the atmosphere and that fever and kindred diseases from this cause are not unfrequent. This is the excuse that some of our Congressmen make for tippling. They say their physicians advise it for keeping off malaria, and they are very sorry. Now, if the Capital can not be moved to some higher latitude, where our Congressmen may be taken out of danger of snakes, malaria and monkeys, where they can be refreshed by cooler breezes and exhilarated by natures pure mountain dew, there is still another plan. Let the whiskey of the Capital be "mediested" and not taken straight. When we consider the army experience, we are astonished, with all the Confederate Brigadiers, for which Washingten is noted, that the past should be forgotten, and that the physicians should be so led astray. The representatives of a nation, aught to be kept healthy, and robust.

Labor and Capital.

It may be a matter of interest for us to note that wages are higher in other States, than in South Carolina. The range as taken from carefully compiled statistics is from about \$25 per month, for laborers in the New England States to \$41 in California. In our State, we believe, the average is \$8.

What then is the inference to be drawn from these facts The law of su

in is the law of water seeking its level th nature. It may be said that one cause of higher wages in the Norther state of improvement, and consequently, the greater productiveness of land in these States. We grant this. But, what is the cause of the difference of improvement? It is the combination of capital with labor.

We have adduced these facts to point out what we believe the inter est of the State demands, in the matter of immigration. We don't want all laborers, but we need a considerable amount of capital. Politically and agriculturally, it is the settler of means who buys a farm for himself, or who starts a factory, a mill or some other useful enterprise, whom we need just now as much, if not more than the laborer. It is true that labor is gradually getting higher, but the immigration of actual land owners will tend to relieve the difficulty as well as the natural increase of our population. We are not opposed to more labor, for it is the strong arm of the laborer who gives life and energy to our land. Wi hout him capital would be fruitless. But it is the combination of capital and labor that we would urge. Let our Immigration Bureau in attending to the one not neglect the other.
