

In November, wipe out the Electoral fraud of 1876! Wipe out imperialism. Wipe out the bible faker and the perjurer of the Credit Mobilier. Wipe out De Golyerism. Our Wors.

Previous to the war the government of our country was administered according to the law and the constitution of the land. The officials were intelligent and honest, its legislators were wise and patriotic and its citizens were true to the traditions and custom of the fathers. The history of that period is luminous with deeds of heroism, such as only gives to a nation a controlling position and influence among the powers of earth. Since the election of President Lincoln however, the country has been ruled by a party who at the beginning broke down the barriers of law, camped outside the constitution and ignored every tradition and custom of the honored past. The administrations of this period have rested like a blight and a pestilence upon the country, filling the land with broken hopes and sorrowing homes. Crimes, of such enormity as no period of corruption ever before experienced, have been unblushingly perpetrated in the face of all mankind. Courts and juries have been packed to serve illegal purposes; the powers of executive department have been prostituted to advance party aims; legislatures have been organized and converted into bands of thieves and public plunderers; whole states have been held as provinces in which officials might revel in crime unwhipped of justice; and even the Chief Magistracy of the nation has been stolen and its official inaugurated by corruption. Indeed the Republican party has been a fraud from beginning to end, and its policy a disgrace to political economy. When the hideous monstrosity shall be displaced in November next, there will not be an official from the President down to the coroner of a county, who shall not be made to cringe and cover in the face of honest men because of his crimes and, who will not be by the verdict of public opinion, be consigned to eternal infamy. Their children's children will feel the curse and wish they had never been born. This period of corruption must end in South Carolina and her citizens must feel that the government is safe in the hands of her own sons. This, then is the work of the Democracy of the state and county from now until November; and if we be true to ourselves victory is as certain as to-morrow's sun will rise.

A United Democracy.

The ratification meeting, held in the city of New York one night last week under the auspices of the Tammany and Irving Hall Democracy united was a grand affair—the largest gathering of citizens witnessed in twenty years. It is estimated that fully two hundred and fifty thousand persons were in attendance—all enthusiastic supporters of Hancock and English. Fifteen speaking places were necessary to supply the vast multitude, and yet there were hundreds who could not get in reach of any stand. Among the statesmen who were invited to address the Democracy on this occasion was Senator Wade Hampton, our own beloved leader, who elicited as much applause and created as much enthusiasm as any of the great Democratic leaders of the country. He told them that a "Solid South" did not mean solid against the North or against the Constitution as Republican campaign speakers had charged, but a people solid for the Democracy of the country, and made so by the fell spirit of sectionalism engendered by Republican hatred. He asserted that the South would be true to the Democracy, the country, the Union and the Constitution. It is but a fair conclusion that this grand meeting of Democrats is only the forerunner of a grander triumph in November next. The enthusiasm will be felt all over the nation and bring the Democratic clans together on a common field to battle against a party whose history is corruption and whose heritage is infamy.

No Fair This Year.

In consequence of the confusion and excitement incident to a national campaign, the Directors of the Orangeburg Agricultural and Mechanical Association have determined not to hold a Fair this fall. Whilst we regret the necessity for such a determination, we see the wisdom of it and hope the Directors may find themselves better prepared for their annual exhibition next fall. The entire agricultural community should feel an interest in this institution and give it their cordial support, not only by a liberal patronage during the Fair, but by a generous subscription to their capital stock. With plenty of money such an association might be made a controlling power for the advancement of the agricultural interest of our county. The farmers need such an influence to unite them, and a moneyed influence is the most potent for this purpose.

The State Campaign.

These meetings are passing off with the utmost satisfaction to the speakers and the party whose policy they advocate. A noticeable improvement is the large increase in the number of colored Democrats in the processions and in attendance at the stand. In Winstboro' a colored woman rode beside her husband at the head of the column of one of the clubs. She wore a red shawl. Gen. Hagood was introduced to her as the first colored woman who had the temerity to declare herself a Democrat so publicly. These meetings are becoming grander and the enthusiasm is deepening day by day, and we trust that the 12th of October, the day appointed for Orangeburg, will find our citizens, white and colored, perfectly aroused and red hot with Democracy.
