

IN MEMORIAM.

John Redden Scott: Formerly of This County.

[Sparterville, Florida Times.]
Scott—Brother John R. Scott was born in Charleston county, South Carolina, October 20th, 1839.

He was converted in 1857 under the ministry of Rev. William Jones, of the South Carolina Conference, and united with the Methodist church. He came to Florida in January 1861. He first served a week in a store in the town of Sparterville; afterwards he taught school for a short while.

In July 1861 he entered in the Confederate army. He belonged to company Q, of the 4th Florida regiment, and held the office of lieutenant, and is said to have been very popular with his com-mands in arms and to have been a true and gallant soldier. He was taken prisoner at the last battle of Murfreesborough, and was carried to Fort Delaware, N. J., where he remained until the war closed. He contracted the disease of which he died by exposure during the war. It first assumed the form of catarrh and later developed into consumption. After the war he returned to Sumter county, where he spent the remainder of his life.

He was united in marriage on January the 1st, 1870, to Miss Francis C. Tompkins of this county. To them were born seven children, six of whom are living; his wife, also, survives him.

Brother Scott seems to have enjoyed the implicit confidence and highest regards of all who knew him. He served his country as treasurer for a long term of years, beginning in 1885. In 1898 he refused to be re-nominated as a candidate for office.

I visited him several times during his last sickness and he always expressed himself as being fully prepared and perfectly willing, even anxious, to depart and be with Christ. On Wednesday, February the 28th, he called his family around his bed and exhorted them to prepare to meet him in Heaven, telling them one more week he would be at home.

On the 29th of last October, being his 69th birthday, he exerted himself and went to the table and dined for the last time with his family.

He held family prayers after he was too weak to bow in prayer. He was conscious to the last, and only a very short while before his departure he insisted on his family sending for help that they might not be alone when he died. He passed away peacefully at 19 minutes to 7 o'clock p.m., March the 8th, 1900.

We laid his body to rest in Oak Grove cemetery in this county, on Friday the 9th inst., in the presence of a large gathering of friends and loved ones.

While this is a sad bereavement, yet thank the Lord this man was not as those who have no hope. Dear weeping ones, look to Him who alone can prepare you for a happy meeting, where good eyes are never sad and sorrow can never enter. R. M. EVANS.
