## IT IS GOV. MCSWEENEY.

TWO-THIRDS OF THE STATE VOTE PUTS HIM 7,500 AHEAD.

Other State Offices in the Lead are  
Lieut. Governor, James H. Tillman, and Railroad Commissioner, J. H. Wharton.

As was predicted by his friends, South Carolina will be governed for the ensuing two years by Miles B. Sweeney.

The race has been an exciting one, the friends of both candidates working hard and leaving no stone unturned to elect their man. The handsome majority for Governor McSweeney indicated by the partial returns leaves no doubt as to the choice of the people.

The vote for lieutenant-governor and railroad commissioner, the other two State offices contested, gives J. H. Tillman 34,598 and J. H. Sloan 26,725; J. H. Wharton 33,436 and W. D. Evans 23,102.

For congress in the 6th district the vote as heard from places Scarborough 1,972 in the lead. Ten boxes in Clarendon give Norton 328, Scarborough 499; Darlington, eight boxes, Norton 713, Scarborough 1,093; Florence, 11 boxes, Norton 872, Scarborough 661; Horry, 10 boxes, Norton 330, Scarborough 1,769; Marion, all but 3 boxes, Norton 1,966, Scarborough 1,023; Marlborough, complete, Norton 749, Scarborough 973; Williamsburg, 7 boxes, Norton 238, Scarborough 340. Total, Norton, 5,196, Scarborough 6,263.
