DR. S. D. M. BYRD.

The news reached this place early Tuesday morning that Dr. S. D. M. Byrd, of Scranton, was dead. He ded Monday evening about 8 o'clock very suddenly. He was in his office at the time of his death with one of his sons transacting business, and without pre monition and not a word of complaint, he fell frum his chair and expired. The people of the community heard of his death with the greatest sorrow, for he had lived and labored among them the greater part of his life, always ready and willing to do this part of anything that pertained to their health, prosperity and happiness. No man was ever more ready to devote his time and means to the welfare of his fellow citizens than the eminent physician and good neighbor whose death is so deeply deplored.

Dr. Byrd had lived out the allotted time to man, and his lite was not one which had tailed to make its impress during the period in which he moved and acted. When very young we find him a soldier in far off Kansas among those from his native State who so earnestly espoused the cause of the South when the squatter sovereignty excitement was so prominent in the political issues of that day. After his return in 1856 or '57 he located at Graham's Cross Roads-now Lake City-for the practice of medicine. His profes- land. sional success was rapid and emimently satisfactory. He became so well known and so popular in the county-then district- that he was induced to enter politics, and was elected to the legislature in 1858. He served the people faithfully and well; and when the war between the States came on he was a brave and gallant officer in that struggle from beginning to end. He never shirked, and always walked in the paths that he conceived to be the paths of duty. He rose during the war from the ranks to the office of major. After the war was over he resumed his place as a physician and citizen and remained true and steadfast to the principles for which he fought. When the reconstruction measures were being enforced on the South, and their train of evils, he fought them with a boldness and pertinacity equaled by few and surpassed by none. He was a terror to the carpetbaggers and their allies in that period of our State's history. His name will go into history as doing perhaps more than any other one man towards redeeming and setting Williamsburg free from rad-

people he was elected to the State senate, succeeding the lamented S. W. Maurice. In all his public life his services and political record stand as witnesses to bis honor and fidelity. He was a man who

was esteemed for his real worth. and was prominent in the affaire of the county, having served as democratic county chairman and in other positions of honor and

At the time of his death he was actively engaged in the effort to have a monument erected to the memory of the Confederate dead of this county. Dr. Byrd was a man of many noble traits of character. He was public spirited and always ready to assist in anything that was for the good of his county and people. He was a large-hearted man, and never turned a deat ear to those who came to him in trouble or distress.

Dr. Byrd was a native of Darlington county. He warried in this county. His first wile was a daughter of lion. N. M. Graham and his second wife was the daughter of the late lamented and widely known Cleland Belin. His second wife and several children. survive him; as siso his only child by his first wife. In his domestic relations Dr. Byrd was all that a as a woman. 
