AUDITOR H. Z. HANNA.

In quick succession some of our best and most useful citizens are passing away. Only a few days ago we announced the death of Dr. Byrd. To-day it is our melancholy duty to chronicle the death of Mr. H. Z. Hanna, auditor of this county, a citizen and public official held in the highest esteem by every one who knew his character and worth. He died at his home January 31, 1901, at the age of 62 years. His death was very sudden and unexpected. He was in his office on Monday previous to his death, and as was his wont, he was bright, cheerful and accommodating in discharging the duties of his office. Not a trace of sickness or disease was discernible in his countenance or his well-known form when he bade his friends good bye here for the last time.

Tuesday he went to Charleston and returned Wednesday evening, and was apparently well up to the time he was attacked by the fatal stroke, which ended his existence in twenty minutes. Between the hours of 12 and 1 o'clock Thursday night he awoke and complained first of his head hurting him, and a few minutes afterwards of a pain at his heart. Remedies were applied by his family as quick as possible, but, without his saying another word, the breath of life passed from him forever.

Mr. Hanna was a native of this county and lived here all his life. Few citizens, if any, ever lived a more upright life and one that elicited more of public confidence and esteem. He loved his country and its history and traditions, and was ever ready to uphold and defend its good name against all foes.

He was a man of liberal education, intelligent and well informed, with a superb capacity for transacting business which required the use of the pen or the use of figures. This capacity was recognized by his fellow-citizens, and by their votes he was elected to the office of county auditor successively for eighteen years, for the two last terms without opposition. No public officer that Williamsburg county has ever had was better qualified, and none has given more universal satisfaction. His work was always neat and correct, and he enjoyed the confidence and approval of his superior in office in the department of government to which he belonged. His place will be hard to fill. Mr. Hanna was a Confederate soldier, and served his country bravely,

and well during the war between the States.

Socially, he was modest and retiring in his intercourse with the people, but kind and sympathetic to all in distress or want. A man of pleasant personality, of stern and inflexible integrity, courteous and true in his friendships he attracted around him the best element of society, which he never failed to appreciate. Mr. Hanna married Miss Mary E., only daughter of the late Robert McFadden, of this county. She and ten children, six sons and four daughters, survive him, all but one being grown up. He was a member of the Indiantown Presbyterian church and also a member of the Masonic order. His death is lamented by the people of the whole county, with whom we profoundly and sorrowfully join our sympathy for the loss of this good, noble, true and useful man and public servant.

Hon. George D. Tillman, affectionately known over the State by his admirers as "Uncle George," died last Saturday at his home, Clark's Hill, in Edgefield county, at the advanced age of seventy two years. Throughout a long and useful career he exerted an influence that will live after him. A true son of his beloved State, he served her with zeal and devotion at home and in national affairs. In George D. Tillman South Carolina loses one of its most valued and patriotic citizens, whose death is universally deplored.

We are glad that the legislature has seen fit to double the appropriation for the old veterans. They are fast passing away. The scythe of time is more deadly than Yankee bullets and their ranks are rapidly thinning out. It is meet and proper that those who survive should be to some extent cared for by the State in whose service they fought for four long years.

### Legislative Matters.

A bill passed Tuesday to increase the pension fund from \$100,000 to \$200,000.

A bill to repeat the income tax law was killed last week.

The bill to elect county dispensers by the people has been in-

definitely postponed.

Hon. T. B. Gourdin, of this county, has two bills pending in the house: One to prohibit the holding of two offices, and another to make ineligible to the office of representative a member of a corporation or an attorney for a corporation.

A bill to repeat the anti free pass law has been introduced both in the house and senate.

The bill to exempt graduates of the S. C. Medical college passed the senate Tuesday night. It has now passed both houses.
