An Ordinance TO PROHIBIT THE KEEPING AND MAINTAINING OF HOGS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF KINGSTREE.

Be it ordained by the intendand and wardens of the Town of Kingstree, 1. That on and after the 1st day of May, A. D. 1901, all owners or tenants of lots within the corporate limits of the town of Kingstree be and are hereby prohibited from keeping or maintaining any hog within the said town, except by special permit from council, to be granted only on the recommendation of the Board of Health. 2. For every violation of this ordinance the party, or parties, so offending shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$20 or 30 days confinement on the chain gang. Ratified this 23 day of April, 1901.

An Ordinance TO PREVENT NUISANCE IN THE TOWN OF KINGSTREE.

Be it ordained by the Intendant and Wardens of the Town of Kingstree, in council assembled, 1. That no privy shall be erected or kept within the corporate limits of the town of Kingstree at such places or in such condition as to be a nuisance or deleterious to the health of the inhabitants of the town. 2. That all privies shall be cleaned out at least twice a month, commencing on the 15th day of April and ending on the first day of December in each year, and at the same time proper disinfectants used. 3. That for each and every violation of this ordinance the offender, or offenders, shall on conviction thereof be liable to a fine not exceeding \$5 or be confined on the chain gang for the full term of 15 days. Ratified this 23 day of April, 1901.

An Ordinance TO REQUIRE OWNERS OR TENANTS OF LOTS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF KINGSTREE TO KEEP THE SAME IN A CLEAN AND DRY CONDITION.

Be it ordained by the Intendant and Wardens of the Town of Kingstree, in council assembled, 1. That all owners or tenants of lots within the corporate limits of the town of Kingstree, be and they are hereby required to keep the same in a clean and dry condition, and to fill up all old wells or pools holding water on the premises. 2. That in default of keeping the said lots as required in paragraph 1 of this ordinance upon conviction thereof the offender, or offenders, shall be fined for each offence not exceeding the sum of \$10, or be confined on the chain gang for the full term of 20 days. Ratified this 23 day of April, 1901.
