RIVER POLLUTION.

Considerable discussion was caused last week by the dumping into the river of the carcasses of several dogs which had died from the effects of poison, as was mentioned in our last issue. When it became generally known that the dead dogs had been thus disposed of so much opposition was aroused that the carcasses were removed from the river and carried outside of the town limits, where they should have been taken at first. It seems that they were thrown into the river through mere thoughtlessness, or a misunderstanding of instructions, and the prompt removal of the contaminating bodies checked the criticism that would have been incurred by the town authorities and the board of health had they allowed the pure waters of our river to be thus polluted.

While it seems that the easiest way to dispose of offal or refuse matter is to dump it into the river and let it float away, a moment's reflection will show at what a fearful cost a little labor is saved. The government reports show that the pollution of streams contiguous to towns and cities cause sickness, injury to business, deterioration of property and a host of other troubles. In New Jersey the Passaic river, whose waters fifteen years ago were pure and pleasant, are to-day so full of filth and stench that the board of trade of Newark, situated on its banks, a few weeks ago passed resolutions petitioning Gov. Voorhees to call an extra session of the legislature that some remedial measure may be taken at an early date.

While the waters of Black river are pure and unpolluted let us profit by the lesson of other short-sighted towns and keep them so. A little precaution in the beginning will save a world of trouble later on.

The Stamp Nuisance.

The revenue stamp has for three years been a nuisance to the general public. Congress has decided to remove some of these revenue nuisances, and the law will take effect July 1st. Among the items included in the repealing act are following: Bank checks, 2 cents; bills of lading for export, 10 cent; bonds, 50 cents; certificates of damage 25 cents; certificates of deposit 22 cents; express receipts 1 cent; insurance, 8 cents on each \$100.00; marine inland and 12 cents on each \$100; casualty, fidelity and guaranty 12 cents on each \$100; lease 25 cents to \$100; money orders 2 cent for each \$1.00; mortgage or conveyance in trust 25

cents for each \$1.50; power of attorney to vote 10 cents; power to sell 25 cents; promissory notes 2 cents for each \$100.00; protest 25 cents; telegraph message 1 cent; telephone message 1 cent; warehouse receipt 25 cents.

Notice was given some time ago to dealers in tobacco that they could be reimbursed for the revenue stamps on the goods on hand. This is accomplished by having disinterested parties make an inventory of the stock on the morning of July 1st.
