Editor W. E. Cook was in town Monday.

Mrs. W. S. Lynch, of Scranton, has been visiting the family of Mr. Louis Jacobs.

It is said now that the cotton crop in Williamsburg county will be fifty per cent short.

Our good friend, Mr. F. Marion Britton, Sr., of Church, paid us a pleasant call Monday.

The enrollment of the graded school is now 115 pupils, and the number is increasing weekly.

Cotton is quoted to-day (Wednesday) in the local market at 8 1/2 to 8 3/4. For seed \$13.50 a ton is paid.

Old "75," the morning train from Charleston, is falling into disreputable habits again. After a fine record of punctuality for some months she came in 2 1/2 hours late Tuesday.

Capt. John A. Kelley's family returned home last Thursday from Mt. Pleasant, where they have spent a delightful summer luxuriating in surf bathing and the epicurean dainties with which the sea abounds.

The new town council was sworn in last week. The first case before Mayor Kelley was that of William Brown for drunkenness and disorderly conduct. He got the limit, \$50 fine or 30 days on chain gang, of which option he chose the latter.

Mr. M. L. Allen came up from Florence Monday to take a position with Dr. W. V. Breckington as assistant druggist. Mr. Allen is no stranger here, having filled a similar position last winter in Dr. Scott's drug store.

Following is the crop report from Williamsburg as furnished the U. S. department of agriculture: Greens—The weather has been fine for picking cotton; about two-thirds of a crop is indicated in this section; no corn yet housed; pea-vine hay is very good, as are pastures.—L. E. Burkett.

On Thursday, last week, and Tuesday, this week, the following magistrate's court cases were disposed of: Dave Epps, trespass after notice, dismissed with costs. Ben Bird, larceny from field, guilty. Sentence, \$5 fine or 20 days chain gang. Sara Bird, contempt of court, fined \$1.00. Nellie Kennedy, assault and battery, \$10 fine or 20 days on chain gang. In each case the fines were paid.

Mr. Earl C. Page was in town Monday getting up data for a biographical encyclopedia of South Carolinians who have figured more or less in public life. This work, which is being compiled by Editor J. C. Garlington, of the Spartanburg Herald, is entitled "Men of the Time," and will include about 1000 names and sketches of prominent men of the State. The book is expected to be issued about January, 1902.

Both Wallace's and Robinson's circuses are advertising dates in the upper part of the State. At least one of them is apt to come this way.

One of the most practical and forcible sermons we have heard in a long time was delivered by Rev. W. S. Martin at the Methodist church Sunday morning.
