A TERRIBLE TRAGEDY.

Mr. T. B. Mimms Drowned in Black River While Going Home from Kingstree.

It is seldoM that we are called upon to record a more terrible tragedy than the drowning of Mr. T. B. Mims, which occurred on Wednesday night, October 2, a few miles from town. The manmer of his death is awful to contemplate, and in it is conveyed a selemn warning to every man addicted to the vice of intemperance, be he young or old.

Mr. Mims, who lives five or six miles from here on the Manning read, had come to town to get a doctor for his sick wife. He lingered until about 9 o'clock, leaving town driving in a road cart, and considerably under the influence of liquer. Lustead of following the road home, the horse strayed off in the darkness on a path leading to the river, and arriving at the bank, plunged into the water about three feet below, carrying with him the vehicle and its rying with him the vehicle and its occupant.

Two days passed before the unfortunate man's fate was discoverered, and it was not until Wednesday afternoon that the horse was tracked to the river bank. A few hundred feet down the stream body of the horse was seen in the water and towed ashore, still hitched to the cart. The river was then dragged for the body of the missing man, but up to this time nothing has been found except his hat and cushion and storm apron.

Mr. Mims was 50 years old and leaves a wife and one child. He was thrifty and energetic, and a devoted husband and father. His weakness for strong drink was his chief fault and to it he own his untimely end and the bereaved condition of his wife and child. His fate is universally deplored and great sympathy is felt for his
