Theodore Price, the New York cotton broker, makes the statement that the present crop is the lowest average on record for nineteen years. In spite of this the price continues low beyond all reason. Seed, too, is disproportionately low, considering the fact that cotton seed oil is out of sight in price. All kinds of provisions are advancing daily, so that the poor farmer is catching it on every side. Yet if the farmers can manage to hold their cotton and seed a short while longer we believe they will have the situation well in hand, as prices for their products are sure to advance later on.

In the yacht races between Columbia and Shamrock II, the old defender won out in one, two, three order, hence the cup still remains on this side of the water. Sir Thomas Lipton's boat will not be taken home for some time yet, and other races are in prospect. One of these is notably interesting owing to the fact that the crews of the two yachts will be exchanged. This is to determine whether the recent victory is due to the superiority of the American yacht or to the nautical skill of her crew. In this race the odds are in favor of the Shamrock II.

HAMPTON FOR GOVERNOR.

In announcing his withdrawal from the senatorial contest, Col. Willie Jones makes the suggestion that all the candidates for this position stand aside and leave the field open to Gen. Wade Hampton. The other candidates are Messrs. George Johnstone, D. S. Henderson, J. J. Hemphill, John Gary Evans, Asbury Latimer and John L. McLaurin. Colonel Johnstone, like the chivalrous gentleman that he is, endorsed Col Jones' proposition the very day it appeared in the daily papers. Almost equally promptly Mr. Latimer, who is in Washington, gave out an interview declining to withdraw in favor of Gen. Hampton.

This course of action on the part of Johnstone and Latimer is not surprising. It is the expected that happened in both cases. Mr. Latimer is in politics for what there is in it, chiefly the \$5,000 a year salary and the six year senatorial term, while Col. Johnstone, though doubtless equally ambitious, is willing to defer to Gen

eral Hampton that the State may make amends for the injustice done him ten years ago. What the other candidates, between these two extremes, will do remains to be seen.

General Hampton is now a very aged man, having lived far beyond the three score years and ten allotted to humanity. On this Mr. Latimer bases his objection to dragging the grand old hero back into politics. Mr. Latimer's solicitude is touching. Yet there are thousands equally solicitous of General Hampton's welfare who disagree with Mr. Latimer. What could be a more fitting and graceful tribute to the chief figure in South Carolina history to-day, as soldier, statesman, patriot and hero, than that the closing years of his career should be irradiated by a token of the confidence and love of his people? It is claimed the factional lines are obliterated. Now is the time to put it to the test. South Carolina will never have another opportunity to honor her bravest son.

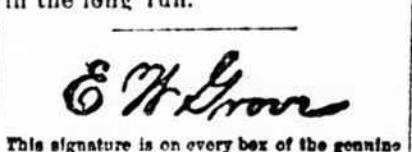
