OPPOSITION SCORES A POINT.

Chief Justice McIver Grants a Temporary Injunction Against the Board of Control.

Lake City, February 12, 1902.—Chief Justice McIver on Tuesday granted a rule to show cause and temporary injunction against the county board of control and Messrs. M. M. Rodgers and P. A. Parker, dispensers for Lake City and Scranton respectively, restraining them from taking any further steps toward opening dispensaries at the towns named, and from selling or causing to be sold any liquors at such places under the dispensary law.

The Nachman property was sold today. The Scranton stock brought 68 1/2 per cent of cost, the mill \$1,100 and 15 mules \$135. The Lake City stock went at \$801.60. Everything was bought in by Mr. H. GONE TO HIS REWARD.

Mr. T. M. Britton, an Honored Citizen of Rome, Passes Away on Monday.

Again it becomes our sad duty to chronicle the death of one of our most highly respected and venerated citizens. Mr. Thomas M. Britton, passed away last Monday at his home near Rome post-office after a painful illness. While his death has for some time seemed inevitable, yet it caused many hearts to ache, and the universal expression we have heard is that in his death the county has lost one of its best citizens.

Mr. Britton was a true man in every sense of the word. Having lived beyond the allotted three score and ten years, his whole life's record is that of a kindly Christian gentleman. He was a consistent member of Union Methodist church, having served for a number of years as superintendent of the Sunday-school and at the time of his death he was a steward of the church. As a soldier in the Confederate army he served his country with the same zeal and fidelity to duty that he showed in his daily walks of life.

Mr. Britton leaves a wife and one daughter, the latter being Mrs. A. B. Hemingway.

The funeral service took place at Union church on Tuesday, where the large concourse of neighbors and friends present testified the esteem in which the deceased was held.

The contract of remodeling and repainting the court house has been completed. Capt. W. B. Funk, the contractor, has certainly done a most creditable piece of work, and our temple of justice is transformed into a handsome edifice that will compare favorably with almost any court house in the State. The granite effect of the painting is especially fine and speaks well for the skill of the artisan, Mr. J. Q. Brady. A taxel-

ing man stopping in town recently mistook the court house in its improved state for a government building.

Hon. J. Davis Carter, of Williamsburg, has introduced in the house of representatives a bill to amend the dispensary laws so as to repeal the provisions relating to Williamsburg, Marion and Oconee counties. In the report of the legislative proceedings only the caption of the bill is given. Hence we do not know the nature of its provisions.

A young, white man, claiming to be from the Harpers section, was arrested Tuesday and tried in the mayor's court on the complaint of a boarding house proprietress, who charged him with cursing and disorderly conduct. It was proven that he followed the lady into her kitchen and so frightened her that she had to leave the house. The defendant pled not guilty, but the testimony of several witnesses was against him; so that, after delivering him a sound lecture, Mayor Kelley sentenced him to pay a fine of \$50 with the alternative of 30 days on the chaingang. Yesterday he was sent to the chaingang.
