## The Senatorial Candidates.

The first division of the State campaign party, or as it is styled by the newspaper correspondents, "Campaign Party No. 1," will be here tomorrow. The party is composed of six candidates for the United States Senate and one candidate—Hon. R. B. Scarborough, who has no opposition—for Congress in the 6th district.

The Senatorial candidates are all well known in public life, all of them having held State or Federal offices except Henderson, who has for a number of years represented Aiken county in the State Senate.

Following is the personnel of the Senatorial party:

Congressman William Elliott, who has represented Williamsburg county, (as a part of the 1st district) in the National Legislature for a number of years. Col. Elliott has many warm personal and political friends here.

State Senator Daniel S. Henderson, of Aiken county.

Former Congressman John J. Hemphill, of Chester county.

Ex-Congressman George Johnstone, of Newberry county.

Congressman Asbury Latimer, of Anderson county.

Former Governor John Gay Evans, who served two terms as Governor, and is generally known throughout the county.

These six gentlemen will be here tomorrow, and we will bespeak for them all a respectful hearing. They are all Democrats, and the issues they represent are practically identical. We hope that a large audience will greet them, and that Williamsburg will sustain her reputation for fair play and justice to those who are here to enlighten the people on the issues of the day and incidentally to gain votes for themselves.

The fifty-seventh Congress adjourned Tuesday at 5:30 p. m. The amount appropriated at this one session approximates one billion dollars.

The Charleston Exposition Company, now struggling against financial disaster, has received a very substantial morsel of comfort in the appropriation of \$160,000 by the government. Tillman got the bill

through the Senate and it was ably looked after in the House by Representative Finley.

## Free Scholarships.

Mrs. Ida M. Linning's Training School for Kindergartners—Charleston, S. C.—Two scholarships of free tuition.

The South Carolina Kindergarten Association Training School—Charleston, S. C.—One scholarship of free tuition.

Mrs. I. A. Smith's School for Young Ladies—Charleston, S. C.—One scholarship free of tuition. Examination June 20th.

Alumnae Club School of Domestic Science—Louisville, Ky.—One scholarship of free tuition.

Miss Ida McCullough's School for Girls—Walhalla, S. C.—One scholarship of free tuition.
