#### An Ordinance

To prohibit the riding of bicycles on the pavements, or sidewalks, of all streets within the town of Kingstree, Be it ordained by the Intendant and Wardens of Kingstree, in council assembled.

1st. That on and after the passage of this act the riding of bicycles on any payement, or sidewalk, of any pavement, or sidewalk, of any street within the incorporate limits of the Town of Kingstree, is hereby pro-

nibited.
2nd. That any person violating this ordinance shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Five (\$5) Dollars, or be confined, at hard labor, on the chaingang for a period not exceeding ten (10) days for each and every violation.

3rd. All Ordinances, or parts of Ordinances in conflict, or inconsistent, with this Ordinance are hereby
