A ROMANTIC MARRIAGE.

On The Florida a Special Near Salters Depot Two Hearts are United.

CHARLESTON, February 26.—Conductor C W Damon of the Atlantic Coast Line New York and Florida Special No 89, yielded command of his train to Dan Cupid very gracefully last night, just after passing Salters, and while Engineer Bright Beard was shoving his engine along at a 50-mile clip, the little love god, through Mr J DeJongh, notary public of Florence, made A W Harrell of Lockhart, Ala, and Miss E O Hammons of Rennert, N C, man and wife, amid the congratulations of their fellow passengers.

The marriage ceremony was completed by the time the flyer reached Lanes, 54 miles from Charleston, and Miss Ledger of Philadelphia thereupon made the happy young people the wedding present of a silver sugar spoon with the sentiment that it might be useful in the sweetness of their wedded life.

Without giving their friends and relatives any special warning Mr Harrell and Miss Hammons left Rennert in the afternoon and had it in mind to telegraph Charleston for a minister, planning to be married there and go on to Alabama. But before reaching Lanes the young people decided that it would be a good thing to become united on the train, so they made inquiries on the vestibule for a minister. For awhile it looked as if they would have to wait until they reached Charleston to arrange for a minister.

Trainmaster Brand of the Atlantic Coast Line proved to be the right man in the right place. He knew that his friend, Mr DeJongh of Florence, a lawyer, special agent of the road and notary public, was on board the train, so Mr DeJongh was found and asked to perform the ceremony. He was quite willing. Mr DeJongh likes to marry people. He believes in helping a good cause always and can tie a neat and secure matrimonial knot.

So it was that the young people stood up before him near Salters with the train rushing on to Lanes. Witnesses were easy to secure. O T Elliott of North Carolina, William Funk of Kingstree and L B Brazell of Florence acted as sponsors and cheerfully indited their signatures on the marriage certificate that Mr DeJongh prepared in a jiffy. He had the two married in proper form and everything shipshape by the time the train arrived at Lanes. He will forward them a formal certificate in a day or two.

After the marriage Mr and Mrs Harrell were surrounded by their fellow passengers who hastened to extend congratulations. It is not often that a marriage is performed on a flying vestibule, and all the passengers were anxious to have a hand in felicitations. Mr DeJongh declared that he would frame the

generous fee that the jubilant bridegroom insisted upon handing him.

It was after the ceremony that Miss Ledger of Philadelphia presented the blushing and charming bride with the silver sugar spoon. She declared that she would never forget the romantic marriage. Miss Ledger was on her way to Florida.

By way of celebrating the marriage the train arrived at Charleston only 20 minutes late. This close shot at schedule time and the marriage combined to make the trip of the train to Charleston memorable.—The State.
