The office of the Supervisor of Registration will be opened on the first Monday in every month for the purpose of the registering of any person who is qualified as follows: Who shall have been a resident of the State for two years, and of the county one year, and of the polling precinct in which the elector offers to vote four months before the day of election, and shall have paid, six months before, any poll tax then due and payable, and who can both read and write any section of the constitution of 1895 submitted to him by the Supervisors of Registration, or who can show that he owns, and has paid all taxes collectable on during the present year, property in this State assessed at three hundred dollars or more.

**ANOTHER "WIRELESS" FROM MOUNTAIN RETREAT.**

REV. MR ERVIN TELLS OF DAILY LIFE "FAR FROM THE MADDING CROWD'S IGNOBLE SWAY."

MONTREAT, August 21:—I send you one more "wireless" message before I leave this mountain glen for home, where I hope to be a day or two before the first Sabbath of September.

Montreat is a place where we all can learn something. That part of the programme in progress now is as follows: At 11 a. m. daily lectures by Dr McPheeters of Columbia, on "Christ's Methods and Principles as an Interpreter of Scripture;" at 4 p. m., "Pastor's Conference on Methods of Church Work;" at 8 p. m., Lectures by Dr Crawford (of Louisville Pres. Sem.) on "The Development of the Messianic Idea in O. T. Prophecy." These lectures are somewhat heavy *pabulum* for popular audiences; and the people are caught partly by the half-hour song service preceding. Something "in lighter vein" was Powell Hale's readings and impersonations last Saturday evening. There has been nothing better on the programme than our own McLee's sermon last Sunday night. Our own Wardlaw is Musical Director. Our own organist of Williamsburg church is at present organist here, so that South Carolina takes a helpful hand in the work, and it is good to be here.

This is a place of good fellowship. You need no introduction to those you meet. The fact that you are here is a certificate of character, and guarantee of good behavior. There are nothing but uplifting attractions here, not even a dance hall; no card table; no resorts of vice; no blind tiger; no licensed place where men can "calmly drink and jaw."

This is a restful place. It has one essential of complete rest and refreshing sleep—and that is quiet. When the daily labor of the cottage builders is done and the sun goes down, or rather withdraws its latest rays from the tops of the mountains and the throbbing of the electric plant ceases for the night, nothing any more interrupts the silence of the outer world. There is no aggravating orchestra of "Mongrel, puppy, whelp and hound and curs of low degree;" no heart-rending, hair-raising caterwaul startling the midnight air; no nightly rapid and drill of rats; these three nuisances of the ordinary civilization have not come in any force yet. Morpheus just comes down, waves his magic wand, and "tired nature's sweet restorer, balmy sleep" begins to "knit the unraveled sleeve of care," nor ceases till the long-risen sun lifts his chin over the ridge of brushy mountain. It is a place of rest.

If for anything I have written, you should ever turn your pilgrim feet hitherward and be disposed to reproach me later for having said nothing of the frequent rains, I will remind you that this is not peculiar to Montreat, but is characteristic of the whole mountain section. But the manner of the Montreat rain is somewhat of a peculiarity. The rain comes straight down, rarely accompanied with wind and so will not cross the window sill. It speedily runs away and leaves the gravelly surface of the roads and paths solid and passable. As wind-storms are rare, so with electric storms. On rare occasions you may hear the distant rumble of thunder, but what you call the thunder-clap is hardly ever heard. If you are "afraid of thunder" or wind, come to Montreat and enjoy a reprieve from your fears. Nature—little harried as yet "by art and man's device"—rules here; and nature in her ordinary mood is gentle; and nature and God are near each other and one is apt to catch the spirit of the place, who carries here long. I have enjoyed nothing here more than the singing of Rev Mr Wright, the Choctaw Indian preacher. The Indians, you know, are of a poetic turn, because, of all other people, they are the children of nature. To see his face radiant and wreathed in smiles as with charming voice he sung the gospel—I shall never forget; especially a song with the refrain—

"I sing because I'm happy—  
I sing because I'm free,  
For His eye is on the sparrow,  
And I know He watches me."
