Want More Cotton to Gin.

Some time during the summer months the people of this immediate vicinity appealed to the home office of the South Atlantic Oil Co for better ginning facilities. Our ginneries were all overhauled and gotten in readiness to meet the gathering of the cotton crop, but we have not been able to operate our plants to their fullest capacity a single day this entire fall. In fact, we have had to close down the down-town ginnery because our supply of cotton was insufficient to keep them all running. Even with this we are not over-worked at oil mill ginnery.

We advertised that we were ready to handle all the cotton that could be brought us for a

radius of ten miles and that we could turn out a bale at this gin every ten minutes and we were not joking. It looks as if too much cotton cannot be brought us and every one that wishes to get cotton ginned will save time by giving us their patronage.

We charge \$2.00 where we furnish second hand bagging and \$2.25 when new bagging is furnished. Considering that this is one of the best cotton markets in any section of the county, not saying anything of the seed market, for it is a candid fact that the best cash prices are always obtained here for them and best exchange for cotton seed meal, isn't it a question of economy to have your cotton hauled here and ginned, letting us handle your seed for the cash or meal given in exchange which we will warrant is always to your advantage. When your cotton is already here where the market is always good?

Bring your cotton for us to gin and let us handle your seed. See that we are kept busy, and we will busy ourselves for you.

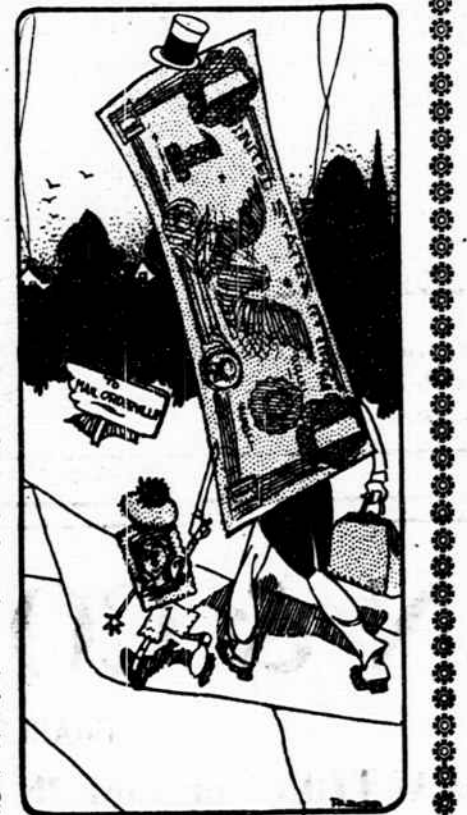
