a dog, and one javeline will whip several dogs. They weigh when full grown from fifty to eighty pounds. They are taller in the fore part of their body than in the rear. In this respect they resemble the wild

The javelines in their wild state run in droves of twenty to fifty. They always travel in single file and appear to have a recognized leader. When feeding or bedded for sleep or rest one of the javelines is always on guard. Whenever a drove of animals is about to cross an open space a sentinel is first sent out to take a view of the situation. If everything is found to be clear the signal is given by the sentinel and the whole drove trots across the clearing and re-enters the chaparral.

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
