There will be frequent band concerts each day, with a poultry and pet stock show at which valuable prizes will be offered and every owner of chickens is invited to enter.

There will be many attractions besides these, among them big reunion of the Confederate veterans of the Pee Dee country at which dinner will be furnished by the ladies.

Advertising matter is now being distributed, the committees are at work and everything will be done to make this a record breaking event.
