For some time these concerns have been in operation at 484 King street, and it is alleged that numerous victims have been induced to forward to them their country produce and never received any

Cordele, Ge, April 19:- Dirt will be broken here Monday morning on the first cotton stalk paper mill ever erected. The Southern Cotton Pulp and Paper company has been chartered with a capital stock of \$175,000 and the material is on the ground for the erection of the buildings. The capacity of the plant will be 25 tons per day. About 40 tons of cotton stalks will be consumed in making a day's output. 
