SENATOR SMITH SPEAKS OUT.

Says He is a Democrat and Will Stick to the Party's Principles.

Washington, May 7.—Senator Smith showed some "emotion" today when he saw The State, containing the extract from the Virginia paper stating the new South Carolina Senator was going to vote for protection on the products of his State. He was at that time turning off a lumber lobby, which wanted to convince him he ought to vote for a duty on lumber. Some of the lumber lobbyists, seeing the piece in the paper, supposed that Smith was open to a proposition, or at least ready to be convinced. This in spite of the fact, the Senator says, that he had told them that he was going to vote the straight Democratic ticket, one plank of whose platform declared specifically for free lumber. The Virginia paper referred to Senator Smith of South Carolina.

"There are a good many Smiths in the country," said the Senator. "Even the Senate here is loaded with them. This particular Smith is a Democrat and whenever he cannot act in accordance with the Democratic party's principles he's going to resign his job and get out."

The lumber lobbyists have been calling on both the South Carolina Senators. Senator Tillman told them the same thing yesterday that Smith told them today—that he was going to vote in accordance with the platform which called for free lumber.

The lumber lobby, by the way, which called on Senators Smith and Tillman represented themselves as from South Carolina. Six men called at Senator Smith's office today, telling him that some of them were from South Carolina and some from other States, who had interests in South Carolina. As they came out I met them.

"Do any of you gentlemen live in South Carolina?" I asked.

"Well," answered one straightforward, honest-looking fellow, "I have interests there, but I cannot exactly say I live there. I live in New York."

"Are any of the others from South Carolina?" I asked.

"No, sir," was his reply.

DIVERSIFICATION NEEDED.

How the South Loses by Sticking to One Crop.

We notice in a Southern newspaper an article concerning the wasteful methods in marketing the cotton crop. Mr George W Truitt says, "Quit going in debt to raise cotton," and Mr Leonidas F Scott insists that the reason a 600 million dollar cotton crop does not make the South the richest country in the world is that Southern farmers buy hay and corn at extortionate prices, buy them regardless of price.

Continuing Mr Scott says that Georgia buys 17 millions worth of fertilizers annually. He adds further that in the past ten years we have lost 300 millions in carelessly packing cotton bales. Ninety farmers out of every hundred he says, think they get paid for the wrappings from a bale of cotton. As a matter of fact, thirty pounds, 6 per cent tare, is taken off of the price of every bale. If each bale of the 1909 crop was properly compressed when ginned and wrapped in cotton it would mean a saving of 30 millions.

We join Mr Scott and Mr Truitt in urging, as we have done for the past generation, the diversification of Southern Agriculture. Every farm is not equally adapted to every crop. Let each farmer find out what his soil is adapted to and raise something besides cotton. Raise corn and cattle, raise hogs, raise oats and alfalfa and Southern cow peas. In this direction lies independence for the Southern farmer.—*Home & Farm.*
