A PLAN TO BUILD AT ONCE THE CONFEDERATE MONUMENT AT ARLINGTON.

All who honor the courage and devotion of the Confederate soldier will please read:

Some years ago, under a generous act of the United States Congress, at government expense the remains of 265 Confederate soldiers, then scattered throughout Arlington and the District of Columbia, were gathered and interred together in a beautiful spot now known as the Confederate section in Arlington cemetery, each grave marked with a marble headstone, identifying the soldier when possible. Practically every Confederate State is named on those slabs.

Later the United States Congress gave by unanimous vote \$200,000 to care for the graves of those who died in Northern prisons. Each of these soldiers, where known, is to have a separate headstone, and the remains of the unknown, it has now been decided by the President, are to be grouped under appropriate monuments.

In the centre of the Confederate section at Arlington is left a mound. There, in sight of Washington city, where for untold generations the American and the foreigner will be pilgrims, the Confederates themselves are expected to build a memorial, which will typify their love of and veneration for their dead.

Soon after the reinterment at Arlington, Confederate organizations in Washington began to move in this matter. In 1906 the United Daughters of the Confederacy, in convention at Gulfport, endorsed the movement and subscribed to it. In 1907 at Norfolk the daughters took full charge, appointing directors in the several States and an executive committee at Washington. All went promptly to work. From all sources the amount received and deposited in the American Security and Trust Company of Washington, D C, as reported at a meeting of our committee on the 5th of April, 1909, was \$3,999.73, besides \$4.50 on hand but not yet deposited, aggregating over ten thousand dollars now in hand.

To build a monument worthy of our dead, and which will represent Arlington, the home of Lee, all the Confederates everywhere, we feel that we need \$30,000 more. This sum can and will be subscribed by our friends at once if they are properly incited: Each local chapter of the daughters is therefore hereby earnestly requested to:

1. Ask the local newspapers, which are always public-spirited, to print an appeal in two (or more, if desired) of their issues preceding the coming local Memorial day, calling attention to the appeal and reinforcing it with editorials.
2. Appoint a number of earnest and efficient young lady canvassers, to be decorated, when soliciting, with appropriate insignia of authority and instruct them to ask of every home, in streets, business houses and places, to contribute 10 cents, inform each person that no more is asked

must politely insist on pinning upon each one who responds a piece of white ribbon upon which is printed "Contributor to Arlington Monument."

3. Amounts thus collected, less necessary expenses, will be sent by check or express to Mr Wallace Streater, treasurer, 3,169 18th street, Washington, D C, who will duly acknowledge as well as publish in the Confederate Veteran of Nashville, Tenn.

This plan energetically carried out it is earnestly hoped will at once enable the organization to ask for designs and bids to be submitted to the U D C at the next convention.

It will be gratifying indeed if the building by the Federal government of the monument it is about to erect over our unknown dead around Northern prisons shall be promptly followed by the consummation of our own plans for such a memorial at Arlington as shall be a source of pride to us and our posterity.

Should every chapter of the Daughters in all the land, whether it is or is not otherwise observing Memorial day, unitedly rise to this work as we confidently expect and in the space of one day raise the sum necessary to complete this monument, what a glorious spectacle of love and patriotism this will present.

Registration

The office of the Supervisor of Registration will be opened a day of July and will remain open every day, except through the months of August for the purpose of the registering of any person who is as follows:

Who shall have been a resident of the State for two years, one county year, and of the precinct in which the elector vote four months before the election, and shall have paid, six months before, any poll tax then due and payable, and who can both read and write any section of the constitution of 1895 submitted to him by the Supervisors of Registration, or who can show that he owns, and has paid all taxes collectable on during the present year, property in this State assessed at three hundred dollars or more.

To Trustees and Others Concerned in the Advancement of Our Educational Interests.

On the first day of July the County Board of Education will appoint trustees of the several school districts to serve for the next two years. I have given this matter considerable thought and have decided to give the people of each district an opportunity to nominate their trustees.

I therefore designate Saturday, May 29, eleven o'clock a m, as the time for all patrons and qualified electors in the various school districts to meet at some suitable place in each district for the purpose of nominating trustees and discussing such other matters of educational interest as they see proper. I hereby request the present trustees of the several districts to name the place of meeting in their district, and to advertise said meetings by posting in public places not fewer than three notices for the small districts and not fewer than five for the large districts, and that one of the trustees act as chairman of the meeting. If no trustee should be present a chairman may be elected.

Nominations may be sent to me as soon as practicable after the meeting.
