

SEMINOLE CASES IN COURT.

President Garlington and Associates to be Tried in Columbia.

Columbia, September 11:—The famous "Seminole cases" were brought up officially in court yesterday when Solicitor Cobb handed out indictments, upon which the grand jury afterwards returned "true bill" in each case. The first charges against John Y Garlington and James Stobo Young "conspiracy, breach of trust with fraudulent intentions and larceny." The second charges "conspiracy and obtaining money and other property by false pretense and representations" and the persons named are: Jno Y Garlington, James Stobo Young, C J Hebert, Orville H Hall, C J Cooper and B W Lacy. It will be observed that the names of M G Jeanes and J H Teague do not appear in the indictments, although their names had heretofore been connected with the case.

Garlington was president of the Seminole Securities company, which was organized avowedly to finance an accident insurance company. J Stobo Young is Garlington's cousin and was secretary of the company. C J Hebert was an expert stock salesman who negotiated a sale between the Seminole company and the Southern Life of Fayetteville, N C. C J Cooper was president of that company and B W Lacy was actuary.

The sale was afterwards repudiated by the stockholders and a great deal of indignation was caused by allegations against the methods of Garlington and his stock salesmen.

The cases will probably be tried at this term of court. Garlington is here with his attorneys, Dial & Todd of Laurens.

That Road Again.

Editor County Record:—

I notice the statement of M M Powell of Harpers relative to the public road from Barton branch to Harmony church. Mr Powell says that I must have replied to his article with some evil intent. I assure him such was not my purpose. Mr J J Graham will testify to the fact that he let the contract for working this road to the gentlemen named in my former article, with the exception of Johnson swamp, for which he said he would let the contract for building a bridge some time later. Mr Powell in his card did not mention the excepted portion, which is in Johnson swamp, for a bridge to be built.

Mr Powell positively denied Mr Graham's exemption of this road and letting of contract, when the repairing contract of the road referred to was completed and Mr Graham had promised to let the contract for the building of a bridge across Johnson swamp. Mr Powell should have made his statement to that effect and not included the entire road in his condemnation. Mr Powell surely will not deny the statement that the road has been worked.

When Mr W T Rowell began work on this road and summoned out those who had not paid road tax, Mr Powell was among the number, who had not paid and refused either to work on the said road or pay his road tax. Mr Powell's case was in the magistrate's court some days ago.

As to the working of the said road, the expense was very small. Mr Wheeler took the contract for working the road from here to Harmony church for only \$18, while Mr Rowell took the part to Barton branch for \$30. Except a small piece in Johnson swamp this road did not need much work, as it had been worked very nicely last year by Mr C W Camlin, of this vicinity. The piece of road from here to Harmony church was ploughed and raked into the middle of the road-bed which will make it a good road for years, except as to filling a few holes. The portion of the road from here to Barton branch was also worked by Mr Camlin, who ditched and drained it and put the road into good traveling condition. All the repair work needed this year was grubbing, filling up holes and mending a few small bridges.
