

WHITE MAN SENTENCED TO HANG.

Spartanburg Jury Finds Joe Bates Guilty of Murder.

Spartanburg, October 1:—Joe Bates, a former police officer here, was convicted of murder without recommendation in the court of general sessions here today.

Bates shot and instantly killed Mrs Docia Boiter at the home of W B Cox in this city Sunday, August 29. The woman had previously lived with Bates, but a few weeks before had married J W Boiter, a farmer, residing in the county.

Jealousy was the cause of the crime, one of the most outrageous ever committed in the county. Bates' defense was insanity and he was represented by able counsel.

Bates was sentenced to be hanged on Friday, October 29.

The attorneys for the defence will appeal to the supreme court for a new trial.

CHARLESTON'S BIG MUSICAL EVENT.

For One Week City Will be Given Over to Music Festival.

Charleston is making great preparations for the entertainment of hundreds of visitors from all parts of South Carolina during the week beginning October 25.

The special feature of the week will be a series of five musical concerts, features of which promise to surpass anything of the sort ever attempted in the South. The Russian Symphony Orchestra, an organization of fifty high-class musicians, conducted by Modest Altschuler, has been engaged and the services of soloists of ability and special fitness for the musical number to be given have been contracted for.

The Russian Symphony orchestra has never before visited the South, but during the last two years its fame has been spreading throughout the East and West. Its journey across the continent last spring to the Pacific Coast was marked by a chorus of enthusiastic praise, and critics in New York, Boston, Pittsburg, Cleveland, Detroit, Los Angeles, San Francisco and dozens of other cities have proclaimed its excellence.

A chorus of one hundred male voices and one of one hundred and fifty female voices have been organized and the immense auditorium of the new Charleston Museum is being specially fitted up for the occasion. A fund of six thousand dollars has been promised by leading business men of the city to assist in defraying the expenses of this great festival.

Numerous other amusement features are to be provided. King street is to be made the most brilliantly illuminated thoroughfare in the South. The score of torpedo boats and submarines of the Atlantic Torpedo Boat Flotilla will be returning to their home station at the Navy Yard here and it is hoped to have other naval attractions.

Charleston is never more attractive than at this season of the year and the business and professional men of the city are united in the determination to make the present undertaking a splendid success, one which will be thoroughly enjoyed by the host of visitors whom they hope to have the pleasure of entertaining.

MISTRIAL ORDERED IN BLACK CASE.

Newspaper Admitted to Jury Room and Juror Talked to Employee

Columbia, October 1:—Because a copy of the local morning newspaper found its way into the room of the jury and was read by the jurors, and also because of a conversation between one of the jurors and his employee last night, the Black case has resulted in a mistrial. This unexpected culmination of the sensational "graft" case came in the court of sessions this morning, after Judge Memminger had examined every member of the jury as to the newspaper incident and as to the conversation that Juror J D Perry had last evening from the window of his room at the local hotel, where the jury has been confined since the opening of the trial.

How the paper of September 30 came into the room was established by the statement of one of the jurors that a newsboy passing early yesterday morning had thrown the paper up into one of the rooms where the jurors were kept. But who paid for the paper could not be ascertained by Judge Memminger.

In dismissing the jury Judge Memminger stated that he did so because a serious indiscretion had been committed, but an examination into the matter had not led him to believe that there was any corruption. The position taken by Judge Memminger was that if a verdict of guilty should have been rendered, under the circumstances, a new trial could be secured. On the other hand, if there should be a verdict not guilty the State would have no redress.

John Black, former member of the board of directors of the State dispensary, had been on trial since Wednesday charged with accepting bribes while a member of the said board.

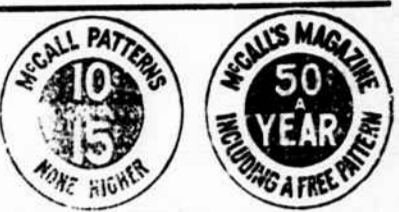
