Mr E K McKnight is one of the most successful farmers in our town, also Mr L A Rogerson is one of the progressive farmers of the West End of Andrews.

With this corps of city fathers at the helm we expect to see the wheels of progress revolve at once, provided our people support them with their undivided efforts.
