THE NEW YEAR AT SALTERS.

First Quarterly Conference Methodist Church--News Notes of Interest.

Salter's Depot, January 17:--The new presiding elder of Kingstree district, Rev W P Meadors, preached an excellent sermon and held quarterly conference at Salter's Depot Friday, January 14. He seemed pleased with the place and people and the people with him. All the churches were represented except Suttons, which would have been but for the illness of Mr Dow Altman, who has been down with pneumonia for more than two weeks. Reports on salary were good for so early in the year. The stewards fixed the pastor's salary at \$670, increasing it \$15 at Gardins. The other churches pay the same as last year. The following delegates were elected to attend the district conference at McClellanville, viz: Messrs J C Everett, G M Beasley, J B Morris, F L Morris and J I Morris.

This charge has made great financial progress since 1895, paying more than three times as much for all purposes last year as it did fifteen years ago. The report Saturday is said to have been the best ever made at the first quarterly conference on this charge. The new pastor, Rev W H Perry, has made a round and a half of appointments and is getting things pretty well in hand. He reports a kind reception at all of his six churches and is hopeful of a good year in every way. He asks the prayers and co-operation of all the people in his year's labors.

Mr Mark Patrick was recommended to the district conference for license to preach. He is a promising young man and is highly esteemed by all the people here. Mr Patrick is on the sick list at present, having hurt himself lifting a sack of salt a few days ago at Mr Ferrell's store, where he is clerking. He is resting in bed at present but is feeling comfortable. The doctor says he must stay in bed

for a week or so.

Mr J C Everett has been away over a week up in Marlboro on a visit to his mother, who fell down the door steps and was badly hurt, but we are glad to know that there is now some hope of her recovery.

Mr E C McDaniel and wife are both on the sick list this week. Mr McDaniel thinks he fractured a rib a few days ago while leaning against a piece of timber where he is building a new house near the Methodist parsonage.

Mrs Mary Magdalene Perry, the mother of Rev W H Perry, is with him for a month or longer. She was a daughter of Rev Chas Barrineau, who moved from this county to North Carolina sixty-two years ago.
