EASTER SUNDAY AT THE CHURCHES.

SPECIAL SERVICES AT THE METHODIST CHURCH AND EPISCOPAL CHAPEL.

Easter Sunday, bright with golden sunshine, was observed with more than usual ceremony at the Methodist church Sunday. The church was appropriately decorated, being adorned with lilies and violets arranged in perfect taste. On the rostrum and inside the chancel were placed a profusion of beautiful palms and ferns, their loveliness enhanced by the handsome jardinières which contained them. All the pulpit accessories were arranged with artistic skill and taste, being strikingly suggestive of the occasion commemorated.
