### STATE AND GENERAL NEWS.

Dr T G Boyce of Covington, Tenn., has been elected president of Due West Female College.

In the burning of the Fish Furniture factory in Chicago last Friday sixteen employees perished in the fire before they could be rescued.

Charles Wimberly was shot fatally by John Pendarvis at an "egg-picking" in Dorchester county Saturday afternoon. Both parties are white.

Governor Ansel has ordered a primary election to be held within the next 30 days to elect a successor to Sheriff J C Blackwell, who died on March 23.

Justice David J Brewer, of the United States supreme court, died suddenly of apoplexy at his home in Washington Monday night. He was 73 years old.

Mrs George E Anderson, wife of a well known young Spartanburg farmer, shot and killed herself Saturday. It is believed that bad health was the cause.

The remains of John Henry Bethea, the man who was slain after killing two railroad men in Philadelphia, was buried in the family grave-yard near Dillon Saturday.

General T L Rosser, a gallant veteran of the Confederacy, who also was appointed brigadier general during the war with Spain, died Tuesday, at his home in Charlottesville, Va., at the age of 73.

Miss Frances McIver, of this State, won the two years' free tuition scholarship in the New York University Law school at the closing exercises of the women's class in that institution last week.

At Batesburg Thursday of last week, W B Glenn shot Clinton Rhoden to death on one of the main streets of the town. Both men are prominent citizens. The affray grew out of an old quarrel.

Gary Brackman, a white boy-twelve years old, was found unconscious Saturday night in an old school-house near Greer's, in Greenville county. The boy was cut almost into shreds and will probably die. The affair seems to be shrouded in mystery.

Mount Aetna, near Cantania, Sicily, whose periodic eruptions have in the past wrought great havoc, has become troublesome recently, causing earth-quakes, and deposits of smoke, ashes and lava, also destroying the homes of residents of the volcanic area.

At Mate-Szalks, Hungary, more than three hundred people were burned to death at a ball Monday. While the dancing was at its height women's dresses became ignited from Chinese lanterns and spread from one to another, causing the terrible disaster.

Sheriff Martin of Charleston went to James Island Sunday just in time to prevent a race riot, which was the outcome of the arrest of five negroes and two white men Saturday. It is said that the negroes were ringing church bells and calling the lawless element together.

Ruth Wheeler, a fifteen year old girl in New York city, was lured from her home last week by a decoy offer of employment and her body found tied up in a sack and placed on the fire escape of an apartment occupied by Albert Wolter, the man charged with the crime, himself a boy only eighteen years old.

In the vicinity of Parks station, near Laurens, Sunday night Tony Anderson was shot dead in the cabin of Ida McCoy Nelson, who was herself mortally wounded, and Alex Ray, living a mile distant, was called to his door and shot through the heart. Two negro desperadoes, Claude Ferguson and Jim Davis, were the murderers of the first two and are suspected of killing the third negro. Both the murderers escaped.
