NEW COUNTY BOOM ON—COUNTY OFFICERS COMPLIMENTED—EQUALIZATION BOARD'S WORK.

Andrews, April 4:—The writer spent nearly all the past week at the county seat as a member of the county board of equalization. This newly organized band deserves great praise for its efforts in this matter. They will play during the season at all picnics and gatherings of the town.

There will be a mass meeting of our citizens in a few days to devise plans to begin the campaign for the county of Andrews. We expect the co-operation of Messrs Brown & Co, Messrs F Rhem & Sons and other prominent business men in the proposed territory. The plan is to cut 14 miles into Williamsburg county and 8 miles into Georgetown and a piece out of Berkeley. We have the use of \$200,000 worth of taxable property in the town of Andrews and as fine a school building as can be found in the county or the lower part of the State. Watch the court house and jail go up in this town within two years. Mr Editor, if you will consider our condition you will give us your efforts in this matter. We want the assistance of both of our county papers, The County Record and the Georgetown Daily Item. We feel that those two papers wield a mighty power in each of their counties.

The office of the Supervisor of Registration will be open on the 1st Monday in each month for the purpose of registering any person who is qualified as follows:

Who shall have been a resident of the State for two years, and of the county one year, and of the polling precinct in which the elector offers to vote four months before the day of election, and shall have paid, six months before, any poll tax then due and payable, and who can both read and write any section of the constitution of 1895 submitted to him by the Supervisors of Registration, or who can show that he owns, and has paid all taxes collectable on during the present year, property in this State assessed at three hundred dollars or more.
