BERRY GROWERS BADLY DEALT WITH--SUNDAY BEAR HUNT--PICTURE AGENT SWINDLERS.

Lake City, April 26:—Hon J Davis Carter was in town Friday from Leo. He reports the farmers in his section as being exceedingly busy now with their work.

Rev Thos Harley of Spartanburg, one of the most aggressive prohibitionists of the State, spent some time in this section last week.

It is really surprising how many people are interested in the marriage license question. This writer has had numerous inquiries about the bill requiring a marriage license, which was before the General Assembly last session. Some seem to think it a wise measure, while others are bitterly opposed to such a thing becoming law.

The carnival company which spent last week here seemed to have some attractions, judging from the crowds which attended the various performances.

The berry growers are complaining bitterly about the manner in which their shipments are being handled by the express people. The berries are being delayed so many hours that they lose the markets of from one to two days. Those acquainted with the business will understand how serious a matter this is. It often means the difference between seven cents a quart and twenty cents a quart, and even more. The blame probably rests with the Adams and United States Express Companies, as the Southern does not operate north of Richmond. Such delays, in addition to excessive rates and unreasonable minimum car-loads, are playing havoc with the business. The naked fact is apparent to any observant man that unless the berry growers are given better treatment in the respects mentioned, by the carriers, they will be forced to abandon the business entirely. Entire fields of berries have already been ploughed up, and the rest will certainly go, unless there be a change and that, too, speedily. Only a few years ago ten to twelve car-loads of berries a day was not an unusual shipment: now one-third that amount would attract attention. Then twenty-five to forty berry drummers and buyers from Northern markets were here at one time; now not one is seen. Instead of encouraging the industry, it appears that the carriers are doing all they can to kill it.

Recently some "picture agents" swindled scores of people in this section. They dealt mostly with the women and their method of procedure was about as follows: One would take an order for an enlarged picture, collecting \$1.98, the price of the picture, together with a chance at a fine premium. Another would follow with the picture in a big gilt frame and inform the dupe that she had drawn a handsome sideboard, or stove or suit of furniture and that the frame and freight on the splendid premium would cost her \$5.00. In every case we have heard of, she "bit" and handed over the \$5.00. The swindler gave a "receipt," signing no name but stating in the receipt that the premium would be delivered by a certain man, not himself, of course. It were needless to add that the "premiums" have not arrived yet.
