If we mistake not, the negro even paid for the telegram the magistrate sent Sheriff Graham advising him to come and take Pendergrass in custody.

Judge Prince refused to grant Attorney Hinds' motion for a new trial in the case of the State vs Mose Jones, charged with assault with intent to ravish, and Jones was given a sentence of five years on the




