Successful Session Promised—New Science Hall.

State University, Columbia, November 21:—The present promises to be one of the most successful years in the history of the University. The session opened with 393 students and ten of that number are from Williamsburg county. A new science hall has just been completed and furnished with all modern appliances. This hall will be formally opened on "Founder's Day," January 14. Dr S A Knapp will deliver the address; on the same day will be awarded the McMaster medal, given by the University for the greatest service done to mankind by one of her alumni. Last year the medal was given to Mr McIver Williamson, and this year it will be given to Dr Gill Wiley. The old science hall has been fitted up as a modern gymnasium; one of the professor's residence has been turned into a Y M C A building, which is known as Flinn hall. This serves as a meeting place for all the students. It also has an excellent reading room, and we are glad to note that every week "The Record" is eagerly read there.

The faculty has planned a course of lectures, one to be given every Thursday night throughout the year. These lectures are free and it is hoped that they will prove beneficial.

The University is an institution of the State and its endeavor is to serve the people of the State in every way possible. Our professors are always ready and willing to go to any com-

munity in any part of the State to lecture on any subject and no charge will be made for the lecture. It is hoped that the people of Williamsburg will take advantage of this opportunity. F R H.

F. Barron Grier, Esq.

Greenwood, November 22:—General Manager Albert W Anderson, of the Charleston and Western Carolina railway, announced here today the appointment of Mr F Barron Grier, of Greenwood, as general counsel for the road to succeed the late Stobo J. Simpson, Esq, of Spartanburg. The appointment of Mr Grier is a deserved recognition of his fine ability and talents as an attorney, and the news of his appointment will be received with pleasure by his many friends all over the State, and especially among his fellow members of the bar. Mr Grier has accepted the appointment.

F. Barron Grier, the new head of

the legal department of the Charleston and Western Carolina railroad, is a young man who has forced his way to the very front in his profession. He is a member of the State board of examiners, appointed by the State supreme court for the examination of applicants for admission to the bar, and has appeared in some of the most important cases in the courts of the Piedmont section in the last few years. He is a native of York county but has made his home in Greenwood county for the past fourteen years.

Mr Grier is a graduate of the Citadel of the class of 1890. He first practiced law at Kingstree and moved from there to Greenwood. He is the senior member of the firm of Grier & Park, attorneys for a large number of corporations in this section, including eight banks, three cotton mills and other large interests in this county. Mr J B Park is the

junior member of the firm. All of the head officials of the Atlantic Coast Line were here yesterday, in conference with Mr Grier, including Mr H Walters, chairman of the board of directors; Mr Alexander Hamilton of Baltimore, chief counsel; General Manager J R Kenley of Wilmington and others.
