MR. LAURENS MOUZON DEAD.

Former Kingstree Citizen Passed Away in Georgetown.

Georgetown, January 4:—Mr Laurens Mouzon died at his residence on Cannon street at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon after an illness of several weeks. He leaves a wife and several young children. Mr Mouzon was one of the most enterprising and prominent of the younger men of the city and was very popular with all classes. He came here from Kingstree nearly fifteen years ago and worked in the various capacities of telegraph operator, express agent and more recently as superintendent of the Georgetown Railway and Lighting company. Mr Mouzon married Miss Esther, eldest daughter of the late Capt D E Gordon, of Lanes.

The funeral services of the Presbyterian church were conducted at the home at 5 o'clock this afternoon by the Rev Mr Parker, and the remains will be moved to Kingstree tomorrow (Thursday) morning for interment in the family burial ground. Large numbers of sorrowing friends were present at the sad exercises this afternoon.
