Death of Mrs. Virtue Tyson Scott.

Once more it becomes our painful duty to chronicle the passing from our midst into the realms of eternity the spirit of one who for many years was identified with much that was highest and best in the church and social relations of our town. Mrs. Virtue Tyson Scott, relict of the late S. McBride Scott, died Friday night, a little after eight o'clock, at her home in town. She had been sick for about two weeks, growing gradually weaker, but with the consciousness of a well-spent life, devoted to good deeds and ministering to the happiness of others; and, withal, the fulfilling, according to her lights, of the highest ideal of Christian womanhood, she faced, calm and unafraid, the pale horseman, and sank into the lethargic slumber of eternity as one "draws the drapery of her couch about her and lies down to pleasant dreams."

Mrs. Scott was the sole remaining member of her immediate family, except her children who survive her. Her husband, a brother and a sister had preceded her to the grave within the last few years and left her alone. Had she lived until May 3, she would have been 73 years old.

Much might be said about this estimable woman—her affectionate nature and unselfish devotion to her husband and children; her boundless hospitality and large charity that included every creature needy or suffering; her kind and motherly spirit which extended to every one about her; her loyalty in her church relations—all this and much more might be dwelt upon, but the innate modesty and distaste for publicity characteristic of her in life should be respected in death and we refrain from further enumerating the graces and virtues of true womanhood that she possessed so abundantly.

She leaves two daughters and three sons, viz: Mrs. J. F. McFadden, Mrs. M. L. Allen and Messrs. Logan, J. F. and William Scott, all of whom reside in or near Kingtree. Besides her death is mourned by a number of relatives and a host of friends. To say that every one who knew her was her friend would be no exaggeration.

The funeral services were conducted at her home Saturday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, Revs. E. E. Ervin and W. A. Fairy officiating. The remains were then conveyed to our
