STATE and GENERAL TOPICS

The Columbia Music Festival begins today.

The census returns give Chester 4,754; Lancaster 2,098; Winnsboro 1,754.

The South Carolina Medical Association is in session in Charleston this week.

Dr Manning Simons, one of the best known surgeons of the State, died Tuesday at his home in Charleston.

In a drunken row among several white men Friday night near Gaffney, Cherokee county, Clarence Moonney was cut to death by Amber Scruggs and Jim Young.

The building and plant of the Toledo Blade, the historic "Petroleum V Nasby's" paper, at Toledo, Ohio, was burned Saturday night. The loss is estimated at \$200,000.

Governor Blease went to Johns Hopkins hospital, Baltimore, last week to consult a specialist, as his local physician feared that he would have to undergo an operation for stomach trouble. After thoroughly diagnosing his case the hospital specialist decided that an operation would not be necessary.

Thursday morning, the 13th inst, the Southern Railway's "Southern Limited", while running at 45 miles an hour, jumped the track near Branchville. There were 43 passengers on board, but no lives were lost and no one seriously hurt. The cars were steel framed and stood the strain, otherwise many lives would in all probability have been lost.

Governor Blease refused two pardon applications last week—that of Jeff Coyle, of Greenwood county, convicted of assault of a high and aggravated nature, and that of Henry Benton, of Colleton county, convicted of violation of the prohibition law. In the latter case the pardon was recommended by Judge Devore, though no reason was assigned for such recommendation.

D W Murden, white, a car repairer in the employ of the Southern Railway company at Lincolnville, in Berkeley county near Charleston, was shot and killed Saturday night by his 16-year-old son, Isaac. Murden, who was on a drunken spree, had threatened to exterminate his family when the boy interfered, with the result above stated. Isaac Murden is held in the county jail at Monck's Corner to await trial for the slaying of his father.

Rev McNeely DuBose, rector of the Episcopal church at Morganton, North Carolina, while out hunting with his two sons last Saturday, was drowned in the Catawba river. He shot a duck on the opposite side of the stream and was drowned while trying to swim the river to secure his game. Rev Mr DuBose was a son of Dr McNeely DuBose of Clarendon county, South Carolina. A very similar accident occurred the week before in Pickens county, this State, whereby Beeman Jones, a young man, was drowned in Keowee river trying to recover a wild duck that he had shot.

NOTES FROM S.C. UNIVERSITY.

Things Seen and Heard About College and Camps.

University of South Carolina, Columbia, S C, April 17:—There will be held here on April 29 a State High-school athletic meet. The delegates will be entertained by the university. A good delegation is expected from Williamsburg county. All desired information on the athletic meet can be had by addressing Mr F E Schofield, care of the university.

The Southern Student Conference of the Young Men's Christian association will be held at Montreat, N C, June 16-25. A delegation of at least 30 men is desired from here. The main object is to train men for Christian leadership in the colleges.

We were greatly honored lately by a visit from Mr Thomas Nelson Page, the great Virginia author.

On April 2 the last of the series of special student services planned for this year was held, Prof J G Clinkseales, of Wofford College, being the speaker.

Mr A H Williams of Lake City will represent the university in the oratorical contest, to be held in Greenwood on April 28.

The Tercentenary of the authorized version of the English Bible will be celebrated on April 23. Various men will speak, among whom will be Dr Mitchell, president of the university. It was three centuries ago, in 1611, that King James' authorized version of the Bible was written. It was the result of seven years labor on the part of forty-seven persons learned in the languages and appointed by King James for its preparation. The efficiency with which this work was done can be seen in the fact that, although several later translations have been made, the King James version continues to be the favorite with almost everyone.
