The fourth grade of the training school won the banner, which was presented to them at the close of the exercises.

Delegates were there from a great number of the YWCA organizations in America and also from London, Paris, Berlin and other foreign cities. At this convention famous speakers from different cities discussed the part that the Young Woman's Christian Association is taking in the world's work. 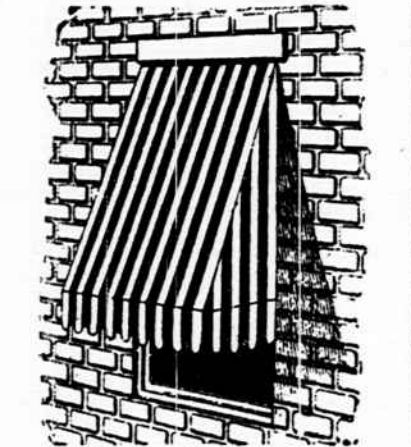
