FOURTH TOBACCO WAREHOUSE PROJECTED--DEATH OF MRS. BROWN--PERSONAL.

Lake City, October 10:--Mrs Ma Sutfcliffe has gone to Newark, N. J. where she will spend the winter with her son, Mr Sidney Sutfcliffe.

Supervisor J B McBride was in his community last week looking after the roads generally.

Miss Mamie McClam entertained some of her friends at her birthday dinner on the 6th instant. They were: Misses Isabelle Taylor, Blanche Stuckey, Lillie McElveen and Sallie Bass and Messrs Eustis Rodgers and Charlie King. The affair was a splendid success and thoroughly enjoyed by all in attendance.

Mrs Geo C Haselton gave an entertainment last Friday evening complimentary to the teachers of the town school.

The cool weather of recent days was as heartily welcomed as the return of some dear friend.

By the opening of the next season there will be another tobacco warehouse in town. Dr M D Nesmith will build one on his lot on Church street, just north of the stables of the J M Truluck Co. It will be 160 feet, with a packhouse adjoining, about 40x60 feet. Work will be begun before long. The property has already been leased for seven years and Dr Nesmith is under contract to have everything completed by June 1 of next year.

Rev W H Whitehead will teach the school which is near Mr A W Rodgers' place the coming term. Mr Whitehead is said to be an exceptionally fine teacher, and this school is very fortunate in securing him.

Mr Martin Epps has gone to Greenville.

The death of Mrs Agnes Mary Brown, wife of Mr R A Brown, which took place on the 5th inst, was more than ordinarily sad. A young woman of exceptionally fine character and with an apparently very bright future before her, just in the full flush of young womanhood, snatched away with but little warning. The seriousness of her illness was not realized until a few hours before the end--not in time for any of her immediate family to reach her. The day of death was the anniversary of her wedding. Mrs Brown was a Miss Hydrick and a daughter of Mr and Mrs A J Hydrick of North, Orangeburg county, and a niece of Judge D Hydrick, of the supreme court. The body, accompanied by the desolated husband, Mr and Mrs A A Brown, Dr A H Williams and Mr J L Richardson, was carried back to the old home and laid to rest. And may her rest be indeed in peace until that bright day when there will be no going down of the sun.

NEGRO LYNCHED AT HONEA PATH For Assaulting Young Girl--Hung by Heels and Shot to Death.

Greenville, October 10:--In the depths of a forest, six miles north of Greenville, an armed mob of twenty-five men, headed by "Citizen" Josh Ashley, of Honea Path, a member of Anderson county's Legislative delegation, overpowered Deputy Sheriff Van B Martin, of Anderson county, and Sheriff J Perry Poole, of Greenville county, this afternoon and took from their custody one Willis Jackson, a 17-year-old negro, charged with criminally assaulting the 11-year-old daughter of a prominent citizen of Honea Path, at 7:30 o'clock this morning.

The trembling negro was placed in the car in which Ashley and four other men rode, and followed by a train of several other automobiles from Anderson and Greenville counties, loaded with determined men and bristling with shotguns and rifles, the ringleaders turned in their fury and started toward Honea Path.

A long distance telephone message from Honea Path says that at 11:24 o'clock to-night, Willis Jackson was swung to a telephone pole by one of his heels and his body riddled with bullets.

The negro was carried to the identical spot where the crime was committed and from there to the nearest telephone pole and swung up by one foot. Four hundred shots, as near as can be estimated, were fired into his body. Winchester rifles, magazine pistols, revolvers and shotguns were the weapons of death used.
