Graduate—Um—well, I learned how to state my ignorance in scientific terms.

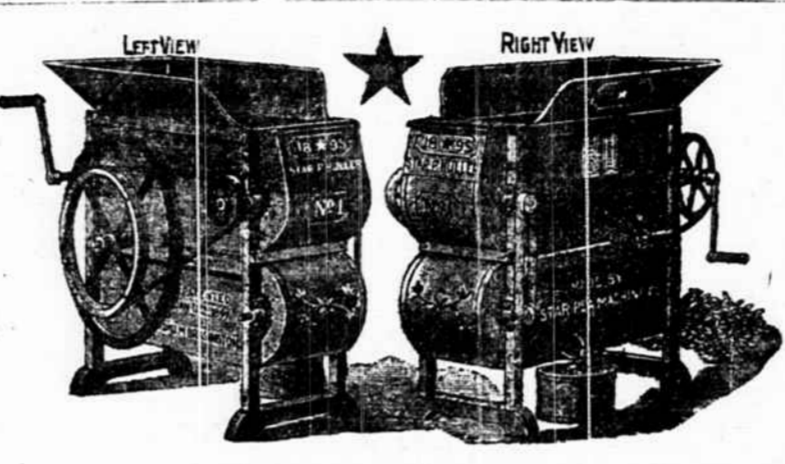
