A WONDERFUL CLIMATE IS THAT OF SOUTH FLA.

LITTLE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN SUMMER AND WINTER--TRUCK PRODUCTS UP AND GROWING.

Editor County Record:—

Now that I have passed through a portion of one winter and the whole of another in South Florida, I presume that I am in position to say something more about what is probably the most wonderful thing connected with the State and that is its climate. Really it is no exaggeration to say that this climate is wonderful. At any rate, I so regard it. The natives do not realize this; those who have never spent a winter here can form but little idea of it; but to one who has lived elsewhere it is something that cannot be expressed save in terms that seem to others hyperbole.

So far as temperature is concerned there is less difference between the summers and winters here than between the springs and summers in Eastern South Carolina. Our winters compare with your Aprils and our summers with your Mays. Three times during this winter there has been enough frost to be seen early in the morning upon tin roofs, but those were hardly true frosts. They appeared immediately after cool rains, and only such substances as tin and the like were reduced in temperature sufficiently low as to condense the moisture to the frost point, and then this point was barely reached. These frosts did absolutely no harm. Even sweet potato vines, tomatoes and other tender plants were so far from being killed that they showed no signs of even the slightest injury. The natives say, however, that this winter has been a little warmer than have been some winters. Now and then a winter comes that kills these plants when in the open, and even ice has been seen; and then again there are winters without even a sign of frost. Therefore, I conclude that this winter is about the medium.

It is difficult for me to speak of this winter in the present tense, for, although it is only the first day of March, and according to the calendar, winter will reign twenty days longer, things around me give the impression and more that we are in the midst of spring. The maples bloomed in January; the young grass on the cattle ranges is well up and growing; and two weeks ago the woods were full of violets. The spring crops of beans, cucumbers, tomatoes, corn, watermelons and so on, are up and growing and some of these are blooming.

By the way, the warm winter in South Carolina, Virginia and farther North hit the Florida truckers hard. Their crops of cabbages and lettuces would not sell at all, for the reason

that in the Central South the weather permitted the growing of these crops right along, and the difference in transportation charges from the Central South to the North and from here to the North shut Florida out of the market on the vegetables named. You see, it is about as far from here to Charleston, SC, as it is from Charleston to Philadelphia. Therefore, the Florida trucker must needs raise something that cannot be grown in South Carolina or Virginia or must raise certain stuff at a time when it cannot be grown there. Otherwise he is not in the game. Hence, those farmers down here who were wise enough to diversify are coming out on tomatoes, cucumbers, celery, pepper, etc, although they had to plough under their cabbage and lettuce.

There has not been a day this winter that one could not work outdoors in comfort, and rarely was a coat needed. Overcoats are owned only by invalids and Northern tourists. There is only one chimney within a mile of us. Some few people have heaters. The others go to the kitchens and gather around the cook stoves when the mornings are too cool to be comfortable in other parts of the house.

One fact, however, there is no denying, and this is that the little cold we have pinches like fury. When a cool change comes suddenly, and sometimes it comes that way, one will shiver and almost imagine he could freeze, notwithstanding the thermometer in front of his nose shows that the temperature is more than fifty degrees warm. Of course he could not freeze if he tried to, but continued warmth during very nearly the entire year relaxes the system and reduces the clothing to such an extent that even a little sudden cool air comes as a shock.
