FRANK FOUND GUILTY

Of Murder of Little Factory Girl-Sentenced to Hang October 10.

Leo M Frank, superintendent of the National Pencil Co, at Atlanta, Ga, was found guilty of murder Monday, after the jury had deliberated three hours. There was no recomter of a few weeks before the in- mendation to mercy and Frank was sentenced to be hanged October 10.

The crime of which Frank was convicted was the murder of Mary Phagan, a 14-year-old girl operative in his pencil factory, on Memorial day, April 26. Frank was also charged with criminally assaulting the little girl. The details of the crime were unspeakably revolting and the people of Atlanta seem to believe Frank

The Solicitor, in his closing argument, spoke over eleven hours. The whole trial lasted nearly a month and is one of the most notable cases in the criminal annals of Georgia.


